

Panthers end three-game slide in Ellis-led victory at Fannin County

Round two of Towns County vs. Union County set for Friday night in Hiawassee

Union County (2-3) snapped out of its recent offensive funk, combining for 140 points last week during Friday's 71-58 victory at rival-Fannin County and Tuesday's 73-69 loss to White County.

The Panthers host Murphy, North Carolina (1-1) on Tuesday before traveling to Towns County (3-2) for a Friday night rematch in Hiawassee. Union County's week concludes Saturday afternoon with a visit to Gainesville's Lakeview Academy (1-5).

Panthers 71, Fannin County 58 - Sophomore Jude Ellis scored 23 of his gamehigh 24 points during the second half to help Union County snap a three-game skid with a Friday night victory in Blue Ridge

Ellis matched a careerhigh while leading the Panthers to their first win at Fannin County since 2018. Sophomores Houston Henry and Hayden Hughes finished with 15 and 12 points, respectively, as Union County found its 3-point stroke, hitting 55% on 12 of 22 shooting from long distance.

"Everything is starting to gel and I think we have some really good basketball ahead of us," said Union County head coach Corey Garrett, fresh off his first win at Fannin as the men's head coach.

Leading 24-19 at the break, the Panthers opened up a 14-point third-quarter advantage after two Ellis treys in two seconds extended a 32-24 margin to 38-24. After Ellis connected on his first trey from the wing at the 4:58 mark, Henry was shoved to the floor while jockeying for position under the basket, handing possession back to Union County. On the ensuing inbounds play, Ellis found daylight in the corner for another triple, granting the Panthers their largest lead of the night at 38-24.

The Rebels refused to wilt, responding with a 16-4 run to slice their deficit to 42-40 with 1:18 left in the period. Without the services of Henry, who picked up his third foul earlier in the frame, the we've known that for a long

blow past his defender for a layup with 4:22 remaining. He capped off his 24-point night on the next possession, drilling a 22-footer off a Rader feed that built a 63-48 margin.

'Fannin went man-toman after halftime and if you try and guard Jude in man, he's going to be tough to stop. But that really goes for all our guys," Garrett said.

The Rebels answered with a 6-0 spurt but Henry hit two free throws at the 1:54 mark and senior Eli Underwood scored down low with a minute left. Sophomore Maddox Young's layup made it a 69-55 game and two more Henry free throws brought the final tally to 71-58.

Three first-quarter treys by Hughes and 6 early points from Henry helped spot Union County an 18-13 advantage after one quarter, then an Ellis free throw made it a 19-13 game early in the second.

Hughes went 4 of 7 from downtown, collecting five boards with one assist and one steal. Underwood faced two and three defenders in the post most of the night but contributed in other ways, nabbing a career-high six steals to go with 5 points, nine boards, three assists and a +13 PM.

"We were trying to pound it into the post early on to get Eli going, but Fannin had two big guys that they were allowing to play super physical," Garrett. "Around halftime, we decided to stop hitting our head into that wall and try to get more inside-out looks. But after halftime, Fannin switched to man and it's pretty welldocumented that we're better against man-to-man, and that's when we really got rolling."

Rader and Young scored 6 points apiece with Young hauling in three boards and Rader doling out two assists. Freshman Cade Dockrey prised at how well Hayden chipped in 2 points and two Hughes can shoot the ball, but boards in 17 minutes of work.

Ellis and Henry's 39 combined points marked a career best for Union County's sophomore duo. "Those two compliment Fannin County tied each other really well and have great chemistry," Garrett said. They play together during the offseason and they know what the other one likes to do. That whole sophomore class, and even the entire team, have all played together for a long time. Fannin County, however, was unable to match the hot-shooting Panthers from 3-point territory, making just 6 of 22 (27%). Union County's 12-of-22 night is its best 3-point performance by totals and percentage in at least three years. The Panthers hit 10 of 16 (63%) at the line and Fannin went 4 of 10 (40%). Ellis began the fourth with a pull-up jumper off a Hughes screen, then junior Braylen Rader drilled a corner-3 for a 51-42 advantage near the 7-minute mark.

"[Rader] is an ultracompetitive, physical player that can guard just about every position on the floor unless it's a 6-foot-4, 6-foot-5 player," Garrett said. "Offensively he can sneak up on you. He can shoot the ball but he can also score at the rim in ways people might not expect.'

Ellis made a 54-44 game a minute later when Hughes collected his own miss and kicked out to Ellis on the right wing.

Underwood finished with career-highs of 27 points and 23 rebounds (11 offensive), scoring eight of his team's 11 first-quarter points and keeping Union County in the game during the early going.

"[Underwood] was huge for us," Garrett said. "Getting 23 rebounds with 11 on the offensive end, that was just a huge spark for us.

The Panthers stormed back to even the game at 37-37 courtesy of a 15-0 run, beginning with four straight to close the half, followed by 11-in-arow to start the third.

A see-saw battle ensued the rest of the way before a Hughes trey beat the thirdquarter horn and broke a 55-55 tie. With Union leading 61-57 following an Underwood putback, Ellis and Henry each collected their fourth foul during the first 96 seconds of the fourth

With two Union starters on the bench, the Warriors rattled off seven straight to regain the lead at 64-61 at the 4:30 mark, prompting the return of

Needing a basket, White County turned to its star freshman Jadon Yeh, who scored on a backdoor layup with 27 seconds left. After a Union miss on the other end, Yeh used a pair of free throws to put the game away and finish with a game-high 36 points on 12-of-21 shooting and 4 of 6 from downtown.

"We lost track of [Yeh] a few times and he really hurt us," Garrett said. "You can't do that with a player like that."

Hughes scored 12 points on 4 of 9 shooting from 3-point territory, sparking the Union County rally with all four treys coming in the third frame.

"Picking them up in man-to-man really helped us on both ends of the floor," Garrett said. "Of course, Hayden Hughes getting super hot from the 3-point line helped a lot on the offensive end.

All but one of Lakeview's five losses were by single digits, an 83-73 defeat vs. Lumpkin County. The Lions' lone win is a 63-48 victory over Class 6A Jackson County.

Union County (2-4) ran into a pair of local powerhouses last week, dropping one-sided contests to Class AAA's sixth-ranked White County and Class AA's fifth-ranked Fannin County

Things don't get much easier this week when the Lady Panthers host reigning Smoky Mountain Conference champion Murphy, North Carolina on Tuesday. Later in the week, Union County pays a visit to 10th-ranked Towns County on Friday looking for its fifth straight win over the Lady Indians. The Lady Panthers travel to Lakeview Academy on Saturday to face the 1-5 Lady Lions.

Lady Panthers 48, No. 6 White County 69 - Union County couldn't keep pace with the Warriors on Tuesday night in Blairsville, surrendering two critical runs that allowed the visitors to pull away.

Leading 14-9 early, White County used a 13-2 run to open up a 27-11 advantage that had the Lady Panthers playing catch-up the rest of the night. White County put the game out of reach during the fourth period, capping a 26-3 outburst that built a 62-31 margin with 7:16 remaining.

Sophomore Ariel Mc-Carter led Union County with 13 points, and senior Corinne Hill scored 12 points with three rebounds and two steals. Junior Lara Turner added 11 points and three boards.

Wrestling: Union takes ninth at Jackson County; Senior Night Friday


