# A Year in Review: Remembering the Top Stories of 2018

Last year is officially in the record books, and with it, 52 weeks' worth of local history. Here are some of the top stories

The 2018 midterm elections were big news around the state and country, and they were big news in Union County,

Perhaps the biggest local election item that had everybody watching the polls in the May 22 General Primary was whether or not voters would support a fifth consecutive Education SPLOST.

And voters did support it, giving the ESPLOST V referendum a decisive thumbs up with 69.66 percent of the vote in favor. All told, 3,756 people voted for it and 1,636 Tony Hunter, Keith Potts and

people voted against it. An ESPLOST is a 1-cent

sales tax that is collected by school systems for up to five years to build new facilities, renovate existing facilities, upgrade HVAC systems in the schools, add to aging bus fleets, update technology and more.

The previous ESPLOST expired over the summer of 2018, shortly after the new one passed, and ESPLOST V collections began promptly on July 1. ESPLOST V has a collections cap of \$21 million.

Three local school board seats were also up for grabs in the General Primary, as the only people to qualify did so as Republicans, meaning whoever won in the primary would be elected following the Nov. 6 General Election.

All three incumbents -

Patrick White – retained their seats on the Union County Board of Education following the May 22 primary.

Of course, Union County wasn't done with elections, not by a long shot.

There was the July 24 General Primary Runoff, which saw the nomination of Brian Kemp over Casey Cagle as the Republican candidate for

Months later, Union Countians voted in the Nov. 6 General Election, which featured another major ballot initiative – SPLOST V.

SPLOST V should not be confused with the ESPLOST that passed in May, as the two are different taxes.

While both are 1-cent countywide sales taxes that have been around for years now, the ESPLOST is collected for use

## **UCSO** looking for Lee in connection with stolen vehicles

At press time Monday, the Union County Sheriff's Office was seeking the public's help in locating Jacob Lee, 20, of Blairsville, who bush bonded after a short vehicle pursuit on Saturday, Dec. 29.

Lee has been on the radar of Sheriff's Office investigators since Dec. 21, when he became a suspect in an alleged stolen vehicle case, according to

UCSO Lt. Daren Osborn.

Authorities had been unable to locate Lee until around 3:45 p.m. on Dec. 29, when Sgt. Andrew Hammond, a patrol deputy, attempted to pull over a vehicle on Old Blue Ridge Highway, said Osborn.

The vehicle - which turned out to be stolen - made a short chase before the driver who turned out to be Lee made a run for it on foot, said Osborn.
