will continue to grow and bring money into our community.

Q. How does the County manage the Farmers Market so efficiently?

A. It could not be done without the people who work there all season at the Farmers Market and the Cannery. Mickey Cummings is the Market Manager who oversees operations, meets with vendors, and verifies that their products are actually hand crafted or locally grown. Then Kristy Peney, the Assistant Market Manager, does a great job of advertising, coordinating with the vendors, and organizing the events. Bobby Burch is there during Market hours to help any way asked by the Market Manager, Assistant Market Manager, or the vendors. On days the Market is not open they are working hard in the cannery, assisted by Patrick Fix. The Farmers Market and Cannery are successful, in part, because of all their hard work and dedication and the support of the public.

Q. What days are the **Trash to Treasures Sales held** at the Farmers Market?

A. Trash to Treasures is open every Friday from now until the end of October. There is one day coming up, May 19th, that Trash to Treasures will not operate. This is due to the Women's Enrichment Center Yard Sale, which is their annual fundraiser. They will have a lot of unique items for sale, along with things that would normally be at Trash to Treasure. Otherwise, you can figure it will be operational all the other Fridays.

Q. What items can be sold at the Trash to Treasures sales?

A. Anything can be sold including new items for resale and gently used items. There are a few things which cannot be sold. These items include home canned foods, produce, and other food items unless you represent a non-profit organization. If you wish to sell produce, talk with a Farmers Market representative to see about renting a booth for Tuesdays and Saturdays at the Farmers Market. Also, people selling plants must obtain a live plant license from the Georgia Department of Agriculture.

Q. What are the hours of operation for the Trash to Treasures Sale at the Farmers Market?

A. It is open to customers from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Vendors can begin to set up at 6:30 a.m. and must be packed up and exited the market by 3 p.m.

One reason some teens decide to start smoking marijuana, drinking alcohol or using other drugs is because they think "everyone is doing it." And, since they think that the majority of their peers are using drugs, they draw the conclusion that it must be okay. If most of the people that you are hanging out with are drinking alcohol or using drugs, it's easy to think that "everyone is doing it." But statistics don't back up

the Future (MTF) nationwide survey of thousands of 12th grade students asks seniors about their use of alcohol and

drugs during their lifetime: 53.3% never used any illegal drug; 58% never smoked marijuana; 90.5% never did inhalants; 90.7% never did tranquilizers; 91.8% never did barbiturates; 93.5% never did ecstasy; 94% never did cocaine; 96.1% never did LSD; 97.6% never did methamphetamine; 98.8% never did heroin.

Make your own choices. Given the above statistics, if you are hanging out with a group of kids that are using drugs to get high, you may want to think about making some new friends. You may be headed toward an alcohol and drug problem if you continue to hang around others who routinely drink alcohol, smoke marijuana, abuse prescription drugs or use illegal drugs. You don't have to go along to get along.

Without knowing what is attacking your plant, it can be nearly impossible to successfully treat. However, by identifying the disease, exploring treatment options, and proactively pruning your plants, you can keep your ornamentals in great condition year after year! If you would like a publication on ornamental pruning or disease management, contact your

local extension office.

day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our country. In 1968, the US Congress, against the wishes of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and numerous unaffiliated Americans, changed the official observance of Memorial Day from May 30 to the last Monday in May (this year, Monday, May 29), in order to create a three-day weekend. Some veterans service organizations, and other Americans across the country were, and continue to be, offended because this change diluted the significance of what Oliver Wendell Holmes called "our most sacred holiday." As a result, several American Legion Posts, VFW Posts, and individual patriots, continue to commemorate the day on the traditional date of May 30, and we invite you to join us.

Oliver Wendell Holmes also urged that "we not ponder with sad thoughts the passing of our heroes, but rather ponder their legacy - the life they made possible for us by their commitment and pain." General George S. Patton Jr. expressed a similar sentiment when he opined, "It is foolish and wrong to mourn the men who died. Rather we should thank God that such men lived."

I am going to follow General Patton's advice, and I invite you to join me, in a simple prayer (author unknown):
