## School, VSOs to host Veterans Day programs Nov. 10

And since talk is cheap, they decided as young men and women to put everything on the line to safeguard the freedoms of this great nation.

Many of these brave Americans paid the ultimate price for freedom by dying at the hands of enemy combatants or by other means in service to their country.

But for the millions of veterans now leading civilian lives, it's not too late to say, often and humbly, "Thank you for your service."

That's what the Union County High School does

every year with its Veterans Day Ceremony, in recognition of the Veterans Day holiday.

Everyone in the community is encouraged to attend the Nov. 10 ceremony, especially veterans and their families, as the event is meant to promote patriotism and veteran awareness all throughout the county and school system.

The student-run service will take place inside Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium at 10 a.m. on Friday, Nov. 10, the day before Veterans Day, with parking adjacent to the football field at the Union County Elementary School.

High school seniors will assume responsibility for conducting a majority of the ceremony, including giving

the invocation for the event, offering opening remarks, delivering a special tribute to veterans, and leading a Quilts of Valor ceremony for three veterans during the program.

Students and staff districtwide will be in attendance for the Veterans Day program, and UCHS seniors involved in running the ceremony will be Madelyn Hood, Emmi Schakat, Coleson Daniels, Hunter Nix, Adrian Shaw and Buddy Viera.

High school and middle school band and chorus classes will perform patriotic music during the ceremony, and the Future Farmers of America, BETA Club and Kelly Helton's Sign Language class will all play their parts, too.

## Safety concerns bring changes to GA 515 entrance at Walmart

The Georgia Department of Transportation has marked out a right-turn only lane using orange road barrels at the Georgia 515 exit of the Blairsville Walmart.

These barrels effectively stop people from making a left out of Walmart and across the four-lane, all in the name of maximizing safety by minimizing the directions of traffic drivers must pay attention to.

Fortunately, the large plastic barrels are only temporary, as GDOT will be working in the coming weeks on several big changes in that area.


## Union County School District, UCHS are No. 1 in CCRPI

How do you improve when you're already No. 1? That's easy – you outdo yourself.

For the second year in a row, both the Union County School District and Union County High School have achieved the rank of No. 1 in CCRPI scores among the 15 school systems in the Pioneer RESA.

This means that, for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 school years, the Union County School District as a whole outperformed all other school districts in the Pioneer RESA with the College and Career Ready Performance Index, and the high school did



the same. The high school earned its spot among the best schools in the state with a CCRPI score of 98, an improvement over its already outstanding CCRPI score of 96.7 from the
