Union knocks off Lady Indians; finish sixth at Battle of the States

Union County's 2013 Battle of the States appearance was high-lighted by their fourth straight win over Towns County.

However, nothing went right for the Lady Panthers (8-3) in the other two games.

Dawson County, the defending Class AAA State runnerup, proved to be too much for Union who was playing without junior forward Lisa Nalaschi. The Lady Tigers (11-3) went on to win 61-25 and advanced all the way to the Battle of the States title game.

On the second day of the tournament, the Lady Panthers took care of Towns County for the third time in less than a month. Union not only defeated

Towns for the fourth consecutive time, they dominated the hosts in a 53-25 blowout. On day three, Hokes Bluff, Ala. stood between the Lady Pan-

thers and fifth place but the Lady Eagles held off Union, 42-36. A back and forth affair shifted in favor of the Lady Eagles (10-4) following a technical foul on the

Hokes Bluff bench. After an intentional foul by the Lady Panthers, the officials decided to take control of things and the scoring grinded to a screeching halt.

With foul trouble mounting for Union in the fourth quarter. Battle of the States All-Tournament selection Brooke Maddox and Ariel Maurer each fouled out of a tightly officiated contest.
"We got blown out, then we

won, then we had a game where the officiating wasn't very good," Union Head Coach David Tucker said. "Their kids (Hokes Bluff) were talking trash and we're not used to that, but the thing is, we still had a chance to win.' Now, as the calender turns

to 2014, the Lady Panthers turn their attention to Region 8-AA. Union will travel to Greene County on Friday for a showdown with the defending Region 8-AA runner-up. Last season, the Lady Tigers defeated Union on buzzer beater.
"That's why you play in

these tournaments; to get you ready for the season," Tucker said. "We fought hard. We had some kids who were sick but they still played hard."

The Lady Panthers will travel to Greene on friday and visit Murphy, NC on Monday, Jan. 6th, still without the services of 8-AA Player of the Year Lauren Zollinger. Although the senior could return sometime next week.
"We got Lauren coming

back in the middle of January. I think we're in pretty good snape, Coach Tucker said.

The tournament concluded for the Panthers with a 68-61 loss to Piedmont, Ala.


Junior Tyler Odom put up 18 points and was named to the All Tournament team.
