A. Our region is consistently lower than the rest of the state. We are consistently one of the lowest ranked counties with our unemployment rate and this is another time when lower is better. Some county rates from our region or as follows: Banks, 5.4 percent, Dawson, 5.5 percent, Forsyth, 5.3 percent, Habersham, 6.5 percent, Hall, 5.9 percent, Lumpkin, 7.1 percent, Rabun, 9.2 percent, Stephens, 6.9 percent, Towns, 6.1 percent, Union County, 5.5 percent, and White, 6.6 percent. The average unemployment rate for the Georgia Mountains Region, which includes most of these counties, is 6.1 percent as of November 2013.

Q. What is considered the full employment rate? A. It varies, but econo-

mists seem to agree that it can range from 4 percent to 6.2 percent, so based on current numbers, Georgia is certainly getting close and our region may almost be there.

Q. Do you feel that these low unemployment

numbers are something to

be excited about? A. I do, with caution. We know that many people with jobs may have lower paying jobs than they have had in the past and that certainly is not good, but the trend is positive.

Once we reach full employment, then the pressure and demand for higher wages usually follows. It is now winter and I think if we see these numbers hold or stay close until Spring, we can really start to be excited about long term reduced unemployment.

While we know there are still people out of work, these are amazing numbers when we were at 7.3 percent just 10 months ago and now 5.5 percent.

Another interesting statistic is that unemployment insurance initial claims for Union County were 72 in November 2012 and down to 34 as of November 2013. So we have evidence and statistics to be cautiously optimistic about the future.
