

Union County wrestling sends four to State Sectionals

The Union County Wrestling program is sending four of its grapplers to the State Sectionals this weekend at Greater Atlanta Christian High School in Norcross.

Four more wrestlers will serve as alternates for Sectionals following a stellar performance at Area that saw Union place 10 of its 12 competitors.

Representing the Panthers at Sectionals will be Alex Barrett, Logan Mc-Clure, Bryan Nelson, and Zach Payton.

Barrett, a freshman. placed third at 106 pounds. Sophomores McClure and Nelson each finished third at 132 and 160 pounds, respectively. Payton, a junior, came in fourth at 220 pounds.

Union's four alternates each placed fifth and could

On Friday, the Panthers traveled to Rabun County where the Wildcats scored 73 points in a 13-point victory.


The Lady Panthers didn't fare any better as they fell 76-41 at Rabun.


Washington Wilkes traveled to Blairsville for a Saturday afternoon contest where both Union County teams could turn things around entering the final week of the regular season.

Unfortunately, the contest was postponed a week because no referees were sent to officiate the game, and Wilkes was forced turnaround and make the long journey home. However, they get to do it all over again next Saturday when the makeup game is scheduled.

Senior Night was scheduled during the Washington Wilkes game and the ceremony went on as planned

Panthers 60 **Rabun County 73**

Tiger - A 29-point second quarter by Rabun blew open a 14-11 game and put Union 21 points behind at the half.

The Panthers cut into the lead during the third and continued to hang around into the fourth quarter but 9-of-12 shooting at the line by the home team kept Union at bay over the final 8 minutes.

Baenninger led the Panthers with 18 points, including a pair of treys in the second quarter in an attempt to stop the bleeding.

Union County basketball now has a back-loaded week ahead of them with three consecutive games, beginning on Thursday.

On Monday, Union hosted Greene County in a makeup game due to winter weather. No results were available as the game was played following the North Georgia News' Monday morning deadline.

On Thursday, Oglethorpe County pays Blairsville a visit in another makeup game. The Lady Panthers are scheduled to tip at 4 p.m.

Union will travel to Social Circle on Friday in what will be the final road game of the regular season. The varsity games get underway at 6 p.m.

The season concludes with Washington Wilkes on Saturday at 2 and 3:30 p.m.

The Lady Panthers (11-8, 4-2) can secure the No. 2 seed in the Region 8-AA Tournament by defeating Greene County on Monday, then winning just one of their final three games

Meanwhile, the Panthers (9-12, 4-4) have an outside shot at second place, but third is more than likely the bestcase scenario. If they were to lose all four games this week, they could fall to last place.

Oglethorpe (4-5) and Greene (4-5) are one game behind Union in the loss column. Washington Wilkes (3-6) is two games back in the loss column and Social Circle (3-7) is three back in the loss column.

While it's not yet official, there is very little doubt that the Region 8-AA Tournament will be held at Rabun County.

Panthers 27 **Riverside 41**

In early January, the Riverside Military Academy Eagles held the Panthers to a then-season-low 30 points. Last week, Riverside topped that defensive performance by



limiting Union to just 27 points the Eagles ended the Union run

in a 41-27 Eagles victory in Blairsville. Riverside put some dis-

tance between themselves and the Panthers with a 13-7 second quarter.

During the second frame, Union connected only twice from the floor on baskets by sophomore Crawford Colwell and senior Chase Shook, who scored six of his team's 11 first close as they would get. half points.

Trailing 21-11 at the break, Shook knocked down a 10-footer to get the Panthers within eight but Riverside answered with a 9-0 run that put Union in a 30-13 hole with 2:57 left in the third frame.

Senior Joseph Mancuso sparked a 7-0 run by the Panthers to trim the deficit back to and a pair of steals. 10 but a tip-in at the buzzer by


and stretched their advantage back to 12 at 32-20 entering the fourth.

The future of Union County vs Rabun County:

As for the Union-Rabun rivalry, with the Panthers moving to Class AAA next season, this could be the final time the Panthers and Wildcats meet for a very long while.

Union and Rabun have shared a region since 1994 and have become each other's longest-running Region rival.

When Union moved up to Class AA prior to the 2000-01 school year, Rabun, Banks, Dawson, Towns, and GAC all made the jump as well.

Over the years, those schools have changed Regions (GAC), moved down to Class A (Towns), or went up to AAA (Dawson and Banks). However, the only constant in 8-AA was Union and Rabun.

As the region was reshaped over the years, and a multitude of schools from the Tennessee state-line to south of I-20 have called 8-AA home, the Panthers and the Wildcats have taken them all on, and for the most part, were extremely successful.

But over the 16 years that the two have shared the region, both programs have witnessed first hand, across all sports, the ebb and flow of a rivalry. Each one would rise, and then fall, then rise again. Or vice versa.

There is a good chance that Union and Rabun will see each other again on the hardwood during next week's Region Tournament, but after that, it's a waiting game to see if Rabun County will be added as a non-region game. Not just in basketball, but hopefully, in as many sports as possible.
