Kings 5&10 building gets new owner; to be restored to past glory

Chris Wadle wasn't around in the hey-day of Kings 5&10.

He's heard countless stories about how the store was once the place where Santa Claus shopped in Blairsville in the decades before his arrival.

Last week, Wadle, his wife Andrea and his infant daughter Brynn became a part of the history of the store that served Blairsville-Union County since 1950.

Wadle, the owner and CEO of Lamin-X, closed on the property last week, and has started an extensive renovation project on the building. Local contractor James Bridges is overseeing the project, Wadle said.

"It's a long-term investment project," Wadle said. "I want to bring the building back to be better than its former glory and still retain the same character."

Wadle envisions five retail/restaurant businesses in the building once the renovation is complete. The project is slated for completion in about 120 days, Wadle said.

Once thought to be headed for demolition, the Kings 5&10 building is still structurally solid, Wadle

"It needs a new roof, we'll put a pitch metal roof on it," Wadle said. "The bones of the structure are solid, it's got great bones. We can bring this building back to life and keep that Downtown feeling on the square intact."

Wadle, a member of the Board of Directors of the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce, has been in the Blairsville-Union County area for 12 years, and it's home to his company, which employs 19 people. "I have a vested interest

here," he said. "I want to help, to do my part. This fell in line as a project that allows me to give back to the community. I've admired this building for some time. I've always believed that it had so much potential.

"When the opportunity to acquire the building arrived, I jumped at it," he said. "Luckily, I have the same vision as the city of Blairsville,

Union County Commissioner Lee Knight and his staff collected more than \$3 million in back taxes in 2013.

They've also collected 90 percent of the 2013 property taxes, Commissioner Knight said.

"For the year 2013, more than \$22 million has been paid to the state, county, school, and city from property and auto tag ad valor-em," Knight said. "The new Georgia TAVT tax on cars has brought in from March 1, 2013 through Dec. 31, more than \$1.9 million, of which Union County kept 43 percent for the county, school,

and city.
"We have all worked

hard on the 2010 tax year, and back taxes and have the collection rate for 2012 and back above 97 percent," Knight said. "Our 2013 collection rate right now is at 90 percent. This year, a 10 percent penalty will be added to a past due tax bill for year 2013 if not paid by March 20, as required by Georgia

Law."

Knight and crew have collected \$3,067,901 in delinquent taxes since Jan. 1,

Tax liens, or Fi Fas, have been filed on 247 Union County properties including mobile homes and personal property such as equipment

or inventory. "We are now working these tax liens through a process," Knight said. "We really want these folks to get in here now and get their taxes caught up. The folks who have not already made arrangements to get their taxes caught up will have liens on their property sold on the courthouse steps on July 1 of this year.

'This is the part of the job that is tough," Knight

ing, but the Jan. 28 snowstorm was met with a full response in Union County. From Tuesday morning

until midnight Friday, Road Department workers in Union County diligently strived to clear snow and ice from local roadways.

Union County school bus drivers had their work cut out for them as they returned students to their homes during the rapidly progressing snowstorm. Thanks to a solid effort

from the county Road Department, those students got home safely. Public safety employ-

ees, including the school bus drivers, law enforcement and Road Department workers were obviously the heroes of

"I want to thank all public safety personnel who worked so long and hard during Snowstorm Leon," Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris said. "We were very fortunate in that while we had a few accidents, mostly it was safe throughout the four days of ice and snow."

Gov. Nathan Deal declared a state of emergency throughout Georgia from Tuesday through Sunday.

"Oddly, one of the most active days was Saturday," Commissioner Paris said. "There were 10 calls to the Fire Department within just a few hours, with a restaurant fire, a heart attack, a death, an accident and other medical calls. It should be comforting to our citizens to know what skilled public safety people we have in place.

Officers worked around the clock, answering calls and working snow-related acci-

"The Union County Sheriff's Office and Blairsville Police Department did a great job as did the Union County Fire Department and our E-911 Communications Center along with the Union General Ambulance Service," Commissioner Paris said. "But I want to give a special call out to our Road Depart-

"From the time the storm began Tuesday morning, they had the salt trucks all over the county," Paris said. "They tried to split shifts and from Tuesday around 11 a.m. until midnight on Friday midnight, they never stopped and ran the salt trucks 24/7."

Paris said the storm presented various obstacles that were difficult to manage.

Knight: 'More than \$3 million in No opposition to shotgun park

Union County and Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris are weeks away from closing a deal that would purchase 9.502 acres off Georgia 515 West for Union County Schools' 4-H Shotgun Team, and eventually a public shooting range, and after last week's public hearing at the Union County Courthouse, the plan hit a bulls-eye with the locals.

The purchase price of the property is \$150,000 with another \$150,000 going into the development of the range. The Union County 4-H will foot \$15,000 of that bill at \$5,000 a year over the next three years.

Let's break down the numbers. A washing machine, on average, uses 25 gallons per load. Brushing your teeth will use one gallon per minute (if you leave the water on). 
Butler awarded Scouting's highest honor

at The Gaylord Texan in Grapevine, Texas.


Created in 1925, the Silver Buffalo Award for Distinguished Service to Youth, is awarded to those persons who give noteworthy and extraordinary service to youth.
