Coyne electrifies with Senior Night triple-double

Rabun County narrowly escapes Blairsville on Friday but not without controversy

Senior Dylan Coyne had a night he will never forget.

With a date to prom secured just moments before tip, the Union County forward put up career highs of 22 points and 10 assists, to go along with 11 rebounds.

The triple-double was the first by a Panther since 2005 when Derek "Shorty" Hughes accomplished the feat with double digit points, rebounds, and steals.

Before the Panthers (13-8, 3-2) went on to blast Murphy, NC, 79-41 on Saturday, Coyne took a leap of faith during the Senior Night ceremonies after the Lady Panthers' game. While his bio was being read

over the public address system, he

included a prom invitation to fellow senior basketball star Lauren "Dylan would like to take this opportunity to ask Lauren if she would give him the honor of taking

her to prom," read Public Address

Announcer Tim Hunter. Zollinger immediately nodded, accepting the invite. Coyne responded with a giant smile and a sigh of relief. He went on to play the game of his life.


With senior Grant Schuette joining Coyne in the starting lineup, Union raced out to a 19-11 lead after a quarter and was never threatened again. Coyne knocked down two 15-foot jumpers during a 10-point opening frame

He would then take on the roll of distributor for the remainder of the half, feeding junior Hunter Hughes, who lit up the Bulldogs for 16 points in the second frame as the Panthers opened up a 41-19 advantage at the

Coyne would connect on a baseline jumper in the quarter for 12 points at the intermission while Hughes led the way with 18 total

Coyne and Hughes would continue to pace the Union County onslaught, combining for 9 points in the third and the Panthers stretched their lead to 60-27.

Coyne came up with one of his 5 steals on the night and drew an intentional foul just 39 seconds into the fourth. He connected on both shots from the stripe - setting a new career





high for points.

He added to his personal best 23 seconds later by nailing another mid-range jumper.

With the home crowd already whipped into a frenzy, Coyne teamed up with Schuette to blow the roof off

Leading the break, Coyne hit Schuette with a behind-the-back pass for a lay up, and his triple-double. On the ensuing possession he was rewarded for his generosity when he got in a lay up before checking out to a standing ovation.

"He was voted as the captain and it was unanimous," Panther Head Coach Casey Jones said. "Tonight he had a triple-double, which was awesome, but he brings so much more to the table. His character, his leadership skills, he's first class. As a first year coach, I'm grateful to have

Schuette's lay up off the Coyne feed gave him a career-high

in the scoring department as well. Schuette finished with 11 points, topping his previous high set at Fannin a


week earlier.

Hughes was just a point away from matching his career high as the junior guard poured in 23 points, but sat for most of the mercy-rule shortened fourth quarter. Meanwhile,





sophomore posts Chase Shook and fans wanted to see. Union allowed a Logan Baker added six and four points respectively, each a career best.

Tyler Odom and Matthew Wasko finished with 4 points each and Thomas Danek had 3 points.

On a side note, sophomore guard Andrew Brown placed a bet with Coyne before the season. The terms of the wager were that if Coyne ever recorded a triple-double, Brown would shave his head. If Coyne collects, Brown should be sporting a new 'do' on Tuesday when Riverside comes to town at 6 p.m. or at Wednesday's make-up game at home with Jefferson, also at 6 p.m.

"I told the guys that when they are 50 years old, if God allows them to live that long, and I hope he does, they will be talking about this night, Coach Jones said. "Dylan is going to be talking about that behind the back pass he threw to Grant."

out indefinitely, Union rallied from 13 down to tie things up at 54-54 with 4:31 to play. The teams exchanged baskets until junior Kyle Hamby nailed a pull-up jumper with 3:48 to give the Panthers their first lead since it was 21-19. All tied up at 58-58, Union

drained almost 90 seconds off the clock before Hughes found an opening and drove baseline, putting the Panthers back on top 60-58 with 48 seconds to play. Just seconds later, Coyne picked the Wildcats for a steal-and-score. With 43 seconds to play, the Panthers appeared to be in control at 62-58.

That's where things turned south, or north, depending on which side of the mountain you were from.

Moments earlier, Hamby was

on a lay up attempt. And with 30 seconds left in the contest, Rabun went inside for two and Union was whistled for a touch foul, resulting in a 3-point play - much to the dismay of the home crowd, with the Hamby no-call still fresh in their minds. The free throw trimmed the Panther lead

Union inbounded the ball and Hughes advanced across half court. He then passed to Hamby, who was fouled. But the clock didn't start, and when it was all sorted out, Rabun was somehow awarded an extra 6 seconds and now 28 seconds stood between the Panthers and the win. Despite the confusion, Hamby

got his much overdue chance at the line and connected on both shots of the 1-and-1, putting the Panthers ahead 64-61 with 22 seconds, no, check that, 28 seconds on the clock. It was the same song and dance on Rabun's next offensive

possession when the Wildcats were

awarded another 3-point play when it appeared from some angles that the Union players were getting out of the way, willing to surrender the lay up with a 3-point lead. Instead, another Rabun free throw tied the game with 20 seconds

left. From that point on, the Panthers made three costly mistakes and suffered the consequences. Union wasted its chance at holding for the last shot when Rabun

forced the Panthers to fire a pass over everyone's head, losing possession. Then two offensive rebounds allowed on the final possession let the

Cats get three shots at the game winner, and the third one dropped with 3 seconds to play. Odom's full court pass to Hughes was on the money and the 22-footer at the buzzer nearly banked

in, but the ball bounced off the backboard and then the front of the rim. Coyne led the Panthers with 14 points and Odom scored 12 despite battling foul trouble. Hughes and Hamby added 9 points each, Arnick had 8 points, Schuette ended up with six, while Danek, Shook, and freshman Lawson Baenninger

On Saturday night, Union County honored its seniors and the Lady Panthers snapped a two-game skid and hopefully corrected course after dropping three-of-four.

The Lady Panthers jumped all over Murphy, NC in the early going and held off the gritty Lady Bulldog squad 53-41.

Union quickly erased an ugly loss to Rabun the night before and raced out to a 19-6 lead over Murphy after a quarter of play.

Juniors Lisa Nalaschi and Brooke Maddox also had to put tough individual performances from Friday in their rear views, and they did, scoring 5 and 6 points respectively in the first quarter.

The Lady Panthers would open the second frame with an 8-4 stretch when a Kaitlyn Day three made it 27-10 with 3:09 left before the half. But the Lady Bulldogs had plenty of fight left in them as they trimmed the Union lead to 29-16, before a free-throw by sophomore Layne Colwell made it 30-16 at the break.

An 11-2 run to open the third by the Lady Panthers and the game was showing all the major symptoms of a blowout, but again, Murphy responded - outscoring Union 8-2 over the final 4:10 of the third quarter. Entering the fourth, Union was nursing a comfortable 15-point margin.





"This is great for Chase and Jon because they are two of our seniors and they wanted to finish




Foot said. "Eigel is just a sophomore and will hopefully finish strong for us the next two years as well.'
