# Danek, Nichols UCHS Star Student, Teacher

Anna Danek is the 2016 STAR Student for Union County High School, for having scored the highest in her class on the SAT, and she has chosen Debbie Nichols to serve as her STAR Teacher.

The pair were honored at the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce's now second annual event, An Evening with the STARS, on Thursday, Feb. 25

Following kind words from her STAR Teacher, as well as from Union County Schools Associate Superintendent Dr. Jeremy Williams, Danek addressed those gathered in her support.

"Ît's definitely an honor and a pleasure to be here tonight, but I know I wouldn't

be standing here without those in the community and those in my family who have helped me along the way, and I want to thank some of those people today," said Danek, thanking her parents, her grandparents, special guests, and members of her church.

But there was one person in particular that Danek said she wanted to thank that evening -Nichols, her STAR Teacher.

The joy that she finds in teaching is contagious," said Danek. "I always leave ready to take on another day. I guess you could say Mrs. Nichols and I are both really nerdy about math. We get into conversations about how great math is and all the cool stuff that you can figure out, and other people just kind of look at us like we're crazy, but we both get it.

"Mrs. Nichols has taught

me more than just math - she has taught me that hard work can overcome any challenge. I learned that she once struggled with math, and it wasn't her best subject. But she persevered, and today, she's one of the best teachers I've ever had. So, Mrs. Nichols, thank you."

Danek plans to attend Covenant College in the fall, a small Christian school in Lookout Mountain, previously attended by all three of her older brothers.

"I haven't decided exactly what I want to major in, but I've been considering engineering or physical therapy," said Danek, adding that she plans to run Cross Country in college. "Even though I'll no longer be in Blairsville, I hope for the continued support of those in this community, and for God to continue placing influential people in my life.

Nichols, chair of the high school's math department and Danek's advanced placement calculus teacher, said that Danek was "amazingly smart," and possessed an ability to discuss high level math with the greatest of ease.

"But as smart as she is, that's not what makes Anna stand out," said Nichols. "She's a hard worker - I've never seen her give up on a problem. No matter how hard it is, she'll sit there and she'll fight with it until she gets it."

Even still, Nichols continued, there was more to Danek than just her natural abilities and tremendous work ethic.

"Anyone who has spent time with Anna immediately recognizes what a sweet spirit and joyful soul she is," said

# Shooting range moving forward

The proposed Union County Shooting Range on Georgia 515 is set to move forward following a second public hearing that occurred on Friday, Feb. 26, in the Union County Courthouse.

Union County Clerk Jennifer Queen opened the well-attended hearing with a statement prepared by Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris, who was detained on other business and could not make the meeting.

"This public hearing is to present the final draft of the plans for the shotgun shooting facility and the cost of that facility," read Queen, who also stated that the first public hearing took place on

Jan. 27, 2014. "The county has pledged \$150,000 from SPLOST funds, plus an inkind contribution of the value of the property. Volunteers will be available to manage

the facility, and the county will provide maintenance and mowing."

At a total estimated cost of \$708,000, the state-of-theart target shooting facility will feature three trap ranges with three shooter pavilions, an office, restrooms, checkin area, and 46 parking spaces, including two that are Americans with Disabilities Act compliant.

Funding for the \$708,000 facility will come in the way of federal funds made available for shooting ranges within the state, at a 75/25 split with the county.

The Georgia Department of Natural Resources will act as the distributing agent and grant writing partner for the federal funds, which will make up \$531,000 of the \$708,000, leaving Union County to bring its contribution of \$177,000 See Range, Page 2A

Qualifying for public office candidacy begins next week, running Monday, March 7, through Friday, March 11.

Political Party and Nonpartisan Candidates running for local office will need to bring their completed candidacy paperwork to the Union County Courthouse during the hours of 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. that Monday through Thursday, and from 9 a.m. to noon on Friday, March 11.

Republican Party Chair Dale Allison will be accepting paperwork for Republican Candidates in an office near the Law Library in the Courthouse.

Those qualifying as Democratic Candidates will need to bring their paperwork to Democratic Party Chair Ruth Ann Miner in the Registrar's

Elections Superintendent Libby Stevens.

All paperwork must be notarized, and fees should be paid when filing for candidacy

Qualifying fees, which were set by Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris in a county meeting in January, are as follows: Sole Commissioner, \$3,095; Tax Commissioner, \$1,492; Clerk of Superior Court, \$1,492; Magistrate Judge, \$1,492; Probate Judge, \$1,492; Sheriff, \$1,780; County Coroner, \$108; Board of Education, \$54; and County Surveyor, \$54.
