Pre-K classroom space is necessary.

Steppe talked with Bright From The Start, Georgia's Early Care and Learning program, and was told that Union County is a Priority I County, meaning the Pre-K program is underserved.

The school system has prepared a grant that could fund an additional classroom. The cost would be \$100,000 for teacher, paraprofessional, and classroom equipment,

Steppe said. "There's a good chance that we can get funding, but I can't guarantee that," Steppe told the BOE.

"We know the children served by the Pre-K program, that it helps them later on," Steppe said. "If it was up to me, I'd have every 4-year-old in the county in that program.

"I'd like for you to consider funding one or two classrooms," Steppe said. "I think we'll get enough children to fill two classrooms. I think it's critical to do this,
