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County to close on Shotgun Park this week supplement the payment of the

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris said that the county will close a deal this week that will purchase 9.502 acres off Georgia 515 West for a Shotgun Park for Union County Schools' 4-H Shotgun Team.

The shooting range will also include provisions for archery and the 4-H BB gun team, and eventually a public shooting range, Paris said.

At a public hearing at the Union County Courthouse on Jan. 27, the plan hit a bulls-eye with locals.

The purchase price of the property is \$150,000 with another \$150,000 going into the development of the range.

The Union County 4-H will foot \$15,000 of that bill at \$5,000 a year over the next three years.

"They agreed to hold fundraisers and pay \$5,000 a year for the next three years to property," Commissioner Paris said.

The shooting range was given a public stamp of approval Jan. 27 when the question was raised by one of the more than 100 residents in attendance, "is there anyone here who doesn't support this plan?

A hush fell over the Union County Jury Assembly Room. Next, heads began to swivel, surveying the room for any raised hands. Not a single arm went up.

"I am very excited about this and thought the public hearing went very well," Commis-sioner Paris said. "There wasn't anyone there who was against the project and that's always good when you have a public hearing

Everyone realizes the impact that this will have on the 4-H program, the kids, their shotgun program, and not only that, the future," Paris said. "I think that positive impact will benefit our community. This will be one of the only skeet and

trap shooting ranges, eventually a public one, north of Atlanta." Following Commissioner Paris' pitch for as to why

the county should move on the property, supporters of the acquisition successfully sold the concept to the residents of Union County.

However, if there was anyone on the fence, or any doubters beforehand, their opin-

ions likely were swayed by the testimonies of the team's coaches, members, former members. and their parents. The property, on the

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north side of Georgia 515, near Queens Gap will become the home for the Union County 4-H Shotgun, BB Gun, and Archery teams.

The home turf would bring a welcomed relief to the teams who have been forced to move locations, being spread out like buckshot across the county during its 17 prosperous years, as these upstanding young men and women have served as noble ambassadors for the local community.

They've also proved something else - they're deadly accurate with a shotgun, BB gun, or a bow.

I anticipate that in the next few days we should be able to close on the property," Commissioner Paris said. Paris approved the contract with

Union County Schools seek Pre-K grant

Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe has announced that the school system is in the process of submitting an application with "Bright from the Start," the administrative organization of Georgia's Pre-K programs, to start a Pre-K program for 4 year olds.

The program will be located in the Union County Primary School, Steppe said.

If the application is approved the new program will begin in August 2014, Steppe

said. Currently, the county only serves a small percentage of the estimated 200-plus 4 year olds in a Pre-K pro-

gram, Steppe said. "The Union County School System would like to see more of these students in a high-quality, early educa-



tion program," Steppe said. "Such a program improves a child's preliteracy, prewriting, and premath skills."

Studies show that children enrolled in such a program are better prepared to begin Kindergarten and their road to a quality education, Steppe said.

vital These skills, Steppe said, have been linked to third-grade reading

achievement, which is a predictor of high school graduation.

"They are also linked to success in math in secondary school and later in life,' Steppe said. "School readiness and the skills gained from high-quality early childhood education are essential to educating a strong workforce that is able to successfully compete in the global economy.'

Part of the application process for this program includes documentation that parents have a true interest in the new program, Steppe said.

"If you would be interested in enrolling your 4-year-old in a Union County School System Pre-K program, please see the information below and complete Options 1, 2, or 3 as soon as possible," Steppe said.
