Union golf has another strong outing at Tri-County Cup

The Union County men's golf team is now 10-1-1 and the Lady Panther golf team sits at 5-2 following the Tri-County Cup last week at Old Union Golf Course.

The Panthers defeated Towns County and Hayesville, NC thanks to a season-low 41 from senior Grant Schuette and three 45's by sophomores Brady Lawn, Nathan South, and freshman Jeremy Herum.

The Lady Panthers fell by a stroke to Towns County and are now 3-2 on the year vs the Lady

The Tri-County match was stopped after 12 holes and Kacie Godwin fired a 67, Maddie Horinek shot a 69, Lydia Gray a 73, and Autumn Johnson a 78.

Other Tri-County scores for the Panther men were Brett Baker - 46, Colby Jones - 47, and Darian Colbroth - 48.

Last month the Panthers defeated Region 8-AA foe Riverside Military Academy at Butternut Creek Golf Course, led by Herum's team-best and seasonbest score of 40. Lawn fired a 43, Baker and Jones each tallied 44, a season low for Baker, and Schuette rounded out Union's top five with a 45.

At Old Union, the Lady Panthers took care of Rabun County by three strokes in their only 8-AA matchup thus far.

Horinek led the way with a 45, Gray shot a 50, Godwin a 57, and Johnson a 61. Horinek's season low score

The rest of the teams' season lows came in a match with Hayesville, NC in mid-March at Butternut. Both Gray and Godwin shot a 49. Johnson posted a 57 and Emmeline Stuart a 70.


For the men, Lawn's personal best came in February when he shot a 39 at Butternut.

For the first time this season, Union County (12-4, 4-3) is above the .500 mark in Region 8-AA play after handing Riverside Military Academy a 10-1 beatdown.

Earlier in the week, the Panthers traveled to Robbinsville, NC and came away with a one-sided victory, 13-2.

Now the Panthers will visit Rabun County looking to avenge a 4-2 loss last month and get back into the race for one of the top two spots in 8-AA, and home field advantage in the postseason.

On Friday, Union will host Social Circle in a 5 p.m. doubleheader before making the return trip to Jefferson next week.

The Panthers took a major step forward in the 8-AA playoff picture with a blowout at Riverside. Lane Everett picked up his fifth win of the year in a complete game, striking out 10 and allowing one earned run.

The Panthers got two in the second when Joseph Mancu-

The Union County Lady Panthers first loss of 2014 was about as painful as they come.
