Union County soccer teams positioning themselves after Spring Break

Both Union County soccer teams are now ready for the stretch run following 11 days off over Spring Break.

The Union County Lady Panthers have already guaranteed themselves a spot in the State Playoffs while the Panthers are on the verge of punching their ticket to Class AA's field of 32.

'The boys have not mathematically clinched yet," Union Head Coach Tim Hunter said. "In the event that Jefferson's boys go on a run and beat Rabun and us, and we lose our remaining region games badly there is a chance we could get knocked out by a tie breaker. Other than that we are in."

With games remaining at Riverside on Friday, and Jefferson at home on Apr. 19, the Panthers currently sit in a second place tie in Region 8-AA and are hoping to maintain that No. 2 spot and secure home field advantage for the first round of State.

"If either us or Rabun beats Jefferson, then the worst we can finish is third," Hunter said. "To clinch home field in the first round of the playoffs, we have to beat Riverside. If we do that, we play at home because the worst we could finish is tied with Riverside and we would have the head-to-head tie breaker over them."

After the Panthers host White County on Tuesday, it's off to Gainesville to meet Riverside where the playoff picture will come into focus. Although, Union will have a tough time with a talented Eagles squad.

"Riverside is very good and they have a lot of skilled players. They have been a 'Jec-

kyll and Hyde' team all year as they lost to Social Circle but then turned around and tied East Hall who is extremely good,' Hunter said. "They are probably the most skilled team in the Region. We will have to play really well against them.

They (Riverside) play quality possession soccer. I don't figure them to change that much. They play a solid 4-4-2 and they possess the ball extremely well. They are a team whose record is very misleading to how talented they are. They have lost games to some quality competition. As for us, our formation has shifted somewhat so early scouting reports won't help them as much. Our focus is ultimately playing at the level we need to.

One of the biggest question marks surrounding Hunter's squad is health.

The Panthers had a difof March, having to play two physical teams on consecutive nights.

"Our guys are battling a lot of injuries," Hunter said. 'We played at Heritage and we were very banged up. Jair Gonzalez is back and should be close to 100 percent, and so is Eric Hougrand. Justin Eigel injured his shoulder at Heritage and he is day to day right now. I'm pretty concerned about his injury as he has been the starting keeper all season long.

The Lady Panthers are still in the hunt for home field advantage, however, that won't be determined until the regular season finale against Jefferson.

"The girls are in no matter what," Hunter said. "The win against Rabun guaranteed a finish of no less than third. If we beat Jefferson then we are second and we play at home.


That game determines whether we play at home or not regardless of the rest of the region standings.'

Besides having already ficult task during the last week clinched, another bonus for the Lady Panthers is being injuryfree at this stage of the season.

"The girls should be close to 100 percent following the week layoff," Hunter said. "Kristena Zeger had injured her ankle but has not been favoring it at practice so she should be back and ready. Soccer is a much more physical game than people realize. Especially those who have never played or never played at a very competitive level. So minor injuries are as common as pigeons as the season goes along."

During the break, both Union County squads have been hard at work preparing themselves for post season positioning as well as finishing the regular season strong and peaking at the right time of year.

"The big focus for our girls is finishing our shot opportunities," Hunter said. "We did a much better job with that against

Rabun. We take a lot of shots but unfortunately haven't converted on as high of a percentage as we should. That can be catastrophic against state level competition as you usually have very limited scoring opportunities.

"For our guys, we have to not stab at the ball so much and be more sound with our passing. That is something that we have worked on all season. The guys have nothing but quality teams left to face so they have to bring their A-game every night for the next four weeks. We are ultimately a fairly inexperienced varsity so we have to learn how to finish the season strong and take good momentum into the state playoffs. Our goal is ultimately to get in the state tournament and get some wins. Our guys haven't been to state in four years and our girls have not advanced to the round of 16 since 2004. It would be huge for both our teams to get wins in the state.

"As high as I set my goals anything less than a Region title is somewhat disappointing. However, the biggest goal decade, and returning to coach school.'

for me with my players is for both squads, Coach Hunter them to play with an internal scoreboard. Not comparing themselves to the other team but to themselves. As long as we put forth our maximum effort and play within our team, I'm proud of them no matter what. It's very important for the seniors to reach the State Tournament. We have set a level of expectations here that seniors should finish their career in the state tournament. I want our players to get to experience that and for our youngsters to learn that level of expectations.

break was getting the Panther squad focused after losing two straight for the first time all season. The Lady Panthers proved that they are a resilient bunch after rebounding from their first ever loss to rival Towns County.

"I was very pleased with how our girls responded," Hunter said. "Marissa Akin getting that very early goal against Rabun was huge for us. She shoulders a lot of the load for the team all year, and she really stepped up her play. She beat the defense and finished a quality shot within the first three minutes of the game. That helped overall with our confidence and also kept us on the offensive.

The boys were still reeling from the Rabun loss in the Heritage game. Hopefully the break has helped heal some of the mental wounds from that. As I said before, they are ultimately an inexperienced group in regards to varsity play so we are going to have to really pull together and play well. Especially as tough as our schedule is the rest of the season."

"I am very pleased with how well our boys have played," Hunter said. "They have exceeded my expectations thus far this season. They have a very tough road ahead and I just hope we can keep our focus and keep our heads up against some of the tough challenges they face. That is always hard for a young team.

Johnson dominated the first half of the race and never dropped lower than fourth. Matt Kenseth was the leader during the middle stages of the race but faded near the end.


There were a total of 12 caution flags, and one red flag period, including three yellows within the last 39 laps.



Each time Johnson was the leader, and each time he got a good jump on the rest of the field.

The last caution came on lap 485 after Kurt Busch's No. 78 hit the outside wall and caught on fire. The red flag was put out and the cars were parked on the front straightaway.

When racing resumed on lap 492, the four leading drivers were; Jimmie Johnson, Clint Bowyer, Jeff Gordon, and Kyle Busch.

Johnson got a good restart and broke away from the others. Clint Bowyer made a good try, but was not able to overtake Johnson.

"I thought we did a pretty good job," said Bowyer. "She (his No. 15 car) was just torn up too bad to race any better. We had a good car and I'm disappointed, but that's the way things happen.'

There was some concern prior to the race as to how clean Bowyer and Jeff Gordon, who finished third, would race each other. Each driver tagged the other at least once, but it was no more than a racing statement.

"We didn't need all those last cautions," said Gordon. "I made a mistake on pit road that cost us some spots. We made a ton of changes today and the car took off. It was awesome on long runs, but we came up short on the shorter runs.'

Kasey Kahne finished fourth, followed by Kyle Busch, Brad Keselowski, Jamie Mc-Murray, Marcos Ambrose, Greg Biffle, and Mark Martin.

Martin, who was subbing for the injured Denny Hamlin was lucky to place in the top-10. He was caught up or involved in four on track skirmishes. During a routine pit stop about midway of the race, he took off before the tire man had tightened the lug nuts on the left front tire. The tire rolled off, putting him a lap

Of the 23 tracks on which the series competes, Johnson has won Sprint Cup races at all but five Michigan International Speedway in Brooklyn, Chicagoland Speedway in Joliet, Ill., Watkins Glen (N.Y.) International, Homestead-Miami Speedway and Kentucky Speedway in Sparta.

Johnson's 10 wins in 2007 was the highest number recorded in a single season since Gordon posted 13 victories in 1998.
