## Class AA No. 1 Jefferson escapes Union after 10 brutal innings

Spring is in the air and that can only mean one thing, high school baseball's regular season is coming down the home stretch.

In a game that would decide the Region Championship, Union County and the Atlanta Journal-Constitution's top-ranked Jefferson Dragons (18-2, 10-0) gave each other all they could handle, and then some, in front of an emotionally charged Blairsville crowd.

Each team struck early for a run before the pitching took over and the game remained tied at 1-1 going into extra innings. Eventually Jefferson put up seven runs in the 10th inning, taking an 8-1

Looking at the final score, one would think the game was one-sided, but it was anything but. These same two teams took 11 innings to reach a decision last month, and the second contest wasn't much different.

With the largest Panther crowd of 2013 in attendance, to say the game had a playoff-type atmosphere would be a radical understatement. Play after play and pitch after pitch, had both sides holding their collective breaths as each pitching staff squared off like two prize fighters going toe-to-toe in the center of the ring.

A full count, bases loaded strikeout, or a perfectly executed pick off play by Union junior Kalvin Duckworth would be followed by a bare-handed, off-balance scoop-and-throw by Jefferson shortstop and University of Georgia commit

That was what it took for the Dragons to overcome a perfect strike by Panther centerfielder Jared Croskey to cut down a runner at the plate. Or a diving underhanded toss by Union pitcher Lane Everett to get a force out at the plate.

"Playoff atmosphere indeed," Union Head Coach Brandon Bradburn said. "That will be good for us later on in the season. The thing that impressed me the most about our guys was our mental toughness. We had several situations where they could have scored earlier in the game, but we pitched around them and played pretty good defense to keep them off the board."

After Jefferson came through with a two-out RBI single in the first inning, Wes Aulet left his mark in the bottom half of the first.

Literally

The Panther senior countered the Dragons' two-out hit with one of his own, blasting

in the scoreboard.

Following an impressive performance in the first meeting with Jefferson, Everett got the ball to start the game. After giving up a run off four singles in the first, the junior settled down and held the Dragons scoreless, until he was pulled in the sixth.

"I decided to start Lane again because of his dominance in game one against Jefferson," Bradburn said. "I was concerned about the pitch counts because they both (Everett the inning. and Duckworth) threw 80-plus

hard to game plan for pitching when you know the game is going to go extra innings and be a nail biter. I had already made the decision after the first time we played Jefferson, so I kept Lane's pitch count lower against Social Circle.'

A lead off single and a one-out walk was the story line for Everett in the second, until a base running blunder handed the Panthers another out. With two on and two out, Everett got a grounder to short to end


The Panthers loaded the



left-field fence, putting a dent pitches four days earlier. Its bases in the bottom of the second after freshman Lance Rich singled, sophomore Jackson Burks drew a free pass, and with two outs, Zach Odom was intentionally walked. Unfortunately, Duckworth ripped a shot into center field, directly at the Dragon outfielder to end the inning.

The third inning saw Jefferson load the bases with one out but a swinging bunt was hit towards Everett who charged, scooped it up and tossed it to the plate for the force. The









Runners left on base continued to be theme for both offenses as each team left two stranded in their next at bat.

It only took 10 pitches for Everett to put the Dragons away in order in the fifth, but Union was unable to capitalize, leaving the bases loaded in the bottom half of the inning.

A lead off walk in the sixth forced Bradburn's hand, and the skipper brought in Duckworth, who walked the first two batters he faced. Luckily, he picked off a runner at first before his third pitch of the game.

With one out, the Dragons laid down a sacrifice bunt, moving two into scoring position, but a grounder to Odom derailed the Dragons' scoring

The 3-2 pitch was fouled back, setting up another 3-2 pitch. But this time, Duckworth blew the high heat past senior Tyler Cole for out number three, igniting the Panther crowd.

## Panther soccer drops third straight, but remain in State playoff contention


