That was the case last week as the Panthers, who start eight freshman and sophomores combined, went to Oglethorpe County with a shot at snagging the No. 2 spot in Region 8-ĂĂ.

"Overall the boys played


very hard against a tough team," Panther Head Coach Tim Hunter said. "Jesus Mancillas showed just how dominant he could be only as a sophomore."


Frankie Vincent scored the next two goals, the first of his varsity career. He was assisted by Jerimiah Troche and Jake Walts.
