Towns Sheriff Clinton to remain Sen. Gooch delivers \$1.4 million for projects on Republican Primary ballot

Towns County Sheriff Chris Clinton will remain on the 2016 Republican Primary Ballot, the Towns County Board of Elections voted 4-0-1 last Monday.

Board member Barbara Shook abstained from the vote.

However, the Board voted to advise Enotah Circuit District Attorney Jeff Langley that information of a 1987 conviction of misdemeanor theft by receiving stolen property in Union County was part of Sheriff Clinton's past.

Langley said last week that he had not received the paperwork from the Towns County Board of Elections, so, he couldn't make comment at this time.

The reason to give that

information to District Attorney Langley is to determine if Sheriff Clinton has committed felony false statements, said Board Co-Chair Mark Dehler.

Sheriff Clinton's qualifications, namely that he had not been convicted of a crime of moral turpitude, were brought into question recently


