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## Baseball: Panthers rally in game one; rout in game two

Union County to host No. 4 Lovett on Tuesday/Wednesday with a Final Four spot at stake

With the bases loaded, nobody out, and Bleckley County already leading 2-0, the Royals were on the brink of blowing things wide open in game one but an unassisted double play by first baseman RJ Banton allowed Union to escape the inning without further damage and would more importantly, turn the tide of the game and the series.

The Panthers, who had not reached the Elite 8 since 1995, would go on to take game one by a score of 4-2 before dismantling Bleckley County 16-0 in game two to set up a date with Lovett on Tuesday in Blairsville with a trip to the Final Four on the line.

Game one - Entering the fourth inning of the first game, Bleckley held a 1-0 advantage and tacked on another run with three straight singles to open the

A walk loaded the bases, and with a full count on the ensuing batter, Union's senior ace Joseph Mancuso blew a fastball by the Royals' Carter Raffield for the first out. Then with an 0-2 count on Bleckley's Cole Brown, a Mancuso fastball was lined directly at Banton, who snagged the out and quickly stepped on first for the inning-ending double-play.

With momentum shifting in favor of the home team, the Panthers (19-7), who were hitless through three innings, began to With one out, Mancuso

laced a shot into left field that was misplayed by the Bleckley outfielder, allowing Mancuso to coast into second with a stand-up

Following a ground out that moved Mancuso to third with two down, the Panthers caught another break when the Royals' shortstop booted a routine ground ball off the bat of Banton that brought Union within a run at 2-1 after

The Panthers recorded two quick outs in the fifth but soon found themselves living dangerously for the second inning in-arow when Bleckley placed runners on second and third following a base hit, a hit-by-pitch, and a passed ball.

With a 1-1 count, Mancuso induced a slow roller to second that was fielded cleanly by a charging Logan Dyer who tossed to Banton, just barely getting the out in seventh inning. a bang-bang play at first, much base coach, who began jumping up-and-down in disagreement with the out-call.




Mancuso went the distance for his sixth win of the year, striking out five, walking three, and scattering six hits - all coming in the first five innings.

In the 26th minute, Vester found Sherman to stretch the lead to 5-0 at the intermission.


Baenninger and Ashlyn Hall got credit for the assist on Yost's second goal of the game and her team's sixth goal, less than 80 seconds into the second half.

Union County's schedule will look very different in 2017 as they join Region 7-AAA where No. 4 Dawson County and No. 6 Lumpkin County reside - both reached the Class AAA Elite 8.

Making the move up from ing a pair of saves by sophomore Class AA to 7-AAA will be Greater Atlanta Christian, the No. 2 team in the state who is currently in the Final Four and looking for its third straight State Championship.

> Moving down from Class AAAA to 7-AAA will be North Hall, who reached the Elite 8 in Class AAAA.

> Other schools in the brutal Region 7-AAA will be Fannin County - a Sweet 16 team in AAA and East Hall - the only Region 7-AAA team that won't be coming off a State Tournament appearance when the season opens in February. With just two seniors grad-

> uating, the Lady Panthers should be able to compete in an ubertough 7-AAA next season.


