
Garrison second at State

Albany - The highly decorated athletic career of Union County's Emma Garrison came to a close over the weekend at Albany High School where she placed second in the 800 Meter race.

Garrison, who entered as Class AA's No. 1 ranked runner in the 800M, fell to the defending State Champion, Bleckley County's Ellen Powell by less than two seconds.

"Emma ran a tight race with Powell and attempted a pass on the back stretch," Union County Track Coach Shawnetta Reece said. "Powell was able to hold her off into the final curve where her sprinting ability gained a step or two of distance away from Emma. Emma did not allow Powell to get too much distance from her and finished strong right behind her.'

Garrison, a two-time Cross Country State Champion, also participated in the

1600M race where she posted coachable athlete who did exa career-best time of 5 minutes, 17 seconds but it was only good enough for a fourth place finish.

The defending 1600M and Cross Country State Champion Serena Tripodi of Lovett finished first. Powell was second and Darlington's Stephanie Ward took third.

'Emma knew she would be challenged in the 1600M by Tripodi and Ward, running a 5:09 and 5:10, respectively at Sectionals," Reece said. "Her goal was to stay with that pack as long as possible and she accomplished her goal by finishing only two seconds behind the State Runner-Up and one second behind the third place finisher, Ward."

There is no doubt that Garrison will graduate as the most successful female runner in school history, and over the past 4 years, UCHS couldn't have been represented by a more remarkable young lady, or a better role model for young runners to look up to.

"Emma has been a very

actly what was asked of her in practice and at meets," Reece said. "I have had the honor and privilege of coaching her for eight seasons, beginning in middle school. She has always shown a tremendous amount of work ethic, but in the weeks leading up to this years Region meet, she pushed herself extremely hard to complete the workouts within her target time. Because of her perseverance and hard work, she set personal records in both the 800m and 1600m from meet-to-meet until she finished her final runs at the State Championship in Albany. She now holds the school record in the 3200M, 1600M, 800M, 300M intermediate hurdles and the 4x400 Relay she ran with the 2014 team including Amy Cummings, Kim Coyne and

Putnam pulls away from Union

Eatonton - While the Lady Panthers and Union baseball played at home last week, the Union County men (9-4-1) went on the road for the second round of the Class AA State Tournament and came up short at Putnam County, 3-1.

The eighth ranked Eagles (18-1-2) held a 1-0 lead at the intermission when senior Jake Waltz connected off a feed from fellow senior Matthew Van Pelt but it wasn't enough as Putnam scored twice during the the final 40 minutes to advance to the Elite 8. The Eagles would defeat 10th ranked Darlington 6-2 to advance to the Final Four where they will face the No. 1 seed from Region 6, Wesleyan. If there is such a thing as moral victories, the Panthers can take solace in the fact that they've been the only team to present a challenge to Putnam during the State Tournament.



As for the other Region 8-AA teams to advance past the first round, Riverside Military Academy gave GAC all they could handle, and then some, but in the end, the Spartans prevailed 1-0.

Social Circle pulled an upset over Region 1-AA's No. 1 seed and seventh ranked Thomasville to advance to the Elite 8 where they ran into second ranked Wesleyan and fell 9-0.
