

Horinek and Godwin's 180 at Sectionals sends Lady Panthers to State


Waycross - The Lady Panthers golf team can be added to the long list of Union County High School athletes who have reached the State Tournament during the 2013-14 school year.

The Lady Panthers finished tied for fourth with a score of 180 at last week's State Sectionals match, held on The Lakes Golf Course at Laura S. Walker State Park in Waycross.

Fellow Region 8-AA foes Rabun County and Jefferson placed ahead of Union at Sectionals with Rabun posting the day's low score - a 169.

Toombs County placed second with a 176, Jefferson came in third at 177, while Union and Bremen each checked in with a 180 - two strokes ahead of Lovett and St. Vincent's Academy, who also qualified for State.

Now the Lady Panthers can turn their attention to Augusta. No, not to that Augusta course, but to the GHSA Golf State Championship, presented by E-Z Go, to be held on May 19th at Pointe South Golf Club in Augusta.


Hiawassee - Mother Nature came through for the approximately 75 athletes who took part in the 2013-14 Special Olympics Spring Games at Towns County High School.

Anderson is a local hero, a paralyzed veteran who has competed in the National Veterans Wheelchair Games and was selected for the World Games in 1999 as part of Team USA. He traveled to New Zealand and won a gold medal in javelin and two silver medals for shot put and discus. He made the 2000 Paralympics team and traveled to Sydney, Australia, to compete. He served a source of inspiration to all the athletes that he came to know that day.


