Mayor: Bid process next step for **Haralson Ramp Project**

The Blairsville Downtown Development Authority held its regular board of directors meeting on Tuesday, May 12, at City Hall.

In the meeting engineer Wayne Fowler of H&H Resources presented the board with the latest details concerning the Haralson Development Project.

The project aims to replace the old ramp leading from Highway 515 to Pat Haralson Drive with an extended ramp, one that will allow spaces for businesses to build closer to the square. The area will also provide more greenspace around the downtown area.

As of now, the DDA is advertising the bidding process for contractors. There will be a June 2 mandatory pre-bid meeting, in which contractors can ask questions about the project and express concerns over the plans.

Bids are slated to be opened June 16, and the bids will take about a week to process, at which time there will be a notice of award. The es-

timated start date for the proj-

ect is around July 20, which will give the bid winner a few weeks to secure bonds for the project and turn in all of their paperwork.

The Georgia Department of Transportation has agreed to kick in \$250,000 worth of funding toward the project if it is under construction by Aug. 1.

Fowler pointed out some interesting aspects of the plans to the DDA board.

"We are converting the intersection at Young Harris Street to a four-way stop," said Fowler. "The DOT is having us do some striping out on the four-lane to convert that center turn lane into a dedicated See Project, Page 2A
