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Francis: 'the future has come'; Hooper: 'thanks to all'

A packed house at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium came to witness the final salute to the Class of 2014 on Friday night.

Threatening clouds turned to rainbows as the seniors of Union County High School took their seats near the 50-yard-line. Dressed in caps and gowns made of traditional school colors, the 125 seniors took their final bows as family, friends and educators looked on.

Approximately 91 percent of the Class of 2014 will attend college; more than \$435,976 in scholarship dollars was earned by these students for college education; 87 completed a CTAE pathway

For two years in a row, the class held the highest Grade Point Average; Football, Track, Cross Country, Softball, Basketball, Baseball, Soccer, Mock Trial, Girl's

Golf, and Skills USA Teams advanced to state tournaments, and Band and Chorus received superior ratings at various festivals.

The Class of 2014 won the U-lympics, a variety of academic and athletic events, two years in a row.

Eight seniors were recognized for joining a branch of the U.S. Military Service.

and Caleb Ussery; U.S. Army/ National Guard (after attending the University of North Georgia): Ryan Rogers. Sam Whitmer will join the United States Air Force after attending Valdosta State. An appreciative crowd applauded after each name was read.

Four seniors signed to play sports at the collegiate level, Lane Everett, (baseball), Georgia Highland College; Erin Innis, (soccer), Agnes Scott University; Luther Jones, (football), Kennesaw State University; and Lauren Zollinger, (basketball), Piedmont College.

UCHS Principal John Hill then introduced the Salutatorian for the Class of 2014, Alice Francis, who plans to attend Georgia Tech in the fall.

"I have to recognize how much support has been congregated in this stadium tonight. On behalf of the Class of 2014, I want to thank you all for the investment you have contributed over the past 18 years.

"Over the years, some-

Valedictorian, Rea gan Hooper then approached the podium. The daughter of Gwen and Tim Hooper, Reagan Hooper plans to attend Southern Polytechnic State University in the fall.

"I would like to let everyone know I'm going to continue my legacy of being a total nerd and chronicle our lives through the halls of UCHS with the cell cycle as my illustration. But first, there is much thanking to be done.

"Thank you to all the teachers and staff who tried to teach us even on the days we didn't want to learn. Thank vou to my church for giving me encouragement and for guiding me in realizing from whom my help comes.

"Thank you to my family for always standing behind me; without my mom I don't know how I would have made it to this moment."

Much to the amusement of her class and the crowd,

Reagan Hooper then proceeded to compare four years of high school to the cell cycle.

'We've shown that we can persevere through the loss of a beloved teacher.

It didn't rain on this parade


