# **UCHS Senior Honors Night 2014**

Family, friends, faculty, and community members were on hand at Blairsville's First Baptist Church last week to honor the 125 members of the Union County High School Graduating Class of 2014.

During the evening, College and Union County Schools Foundation Scholarships were awarded, there was Military recognition, the Valedictorian and Salutatorian were recognized, and Senior Class Awards were presented. Dr. Patricia Slagle, UCHS Counselor, said "Every single member of the Senior Class received a scholarship or an award tonight."

Dr. Slagle and Rick Silver, UCHS Counselors, led the presentation of college scholarships. Scholarships were presented from 14 colleges, 91 percent of this impressive group of young people will go to college following graduation, and a total of more than \$435,976 in scholarship monies was awarded among them.

"I am very thankful for the community's support of our students," said UCHS Principal John Hill. "The various fundraisers, college scholarships, and donations are overwhelming. It takes a collaborative effort to serve these students, and they are our greatest investment. I know the community support makes a tremendous difference in our student futures. Some of our students are exceptionally bright, but are economically disadvantaged. The generous support from the community in the form of scholarships can open a door allowing these students to further their education.'

Young Harris College presented scholarships to 21 UCHS graduates. The schol-arships will total \$1.2 million over the next four years.

Victoria Carter, admissions counselor at YHC, said Union County High School



students are among the top academic performers, year in, year out at Young Harris.

"This is a direct result of the superior preparation they have received from the faculty, staff, and administration here," Carter said. "On behalf of the college, I want to thank Union County teachers, administration, and parents for your friendship and partnership over the years.'

Jim and Sharon Whittle, parents of the late Union County Sheriff Deputy Derrick Whittle, who died in the line of duty in September 2011, presented the Derrick Whittle Memorial Scholarship Award. The Whittles awarded \$8,000 in scholarship money to six UCHS seniors.

Another touching moment came when Shari Rohrbaugh presented the Earl Odom Memorial Scholarship, in honor of her late father, former Superintendent and UCHS Boys Basketball Coach; and the Ed Rohrbaugh Memorial Scholarship in honor of her late husband and former UCHS Principal.

Shari Rohrbaugh ges-tured to the Class of 2014 behind her and said, "Ed loved

you all and would be so proud of you.'

Next, Hill recognized the Class of 2014 Valedictorian, Reagan Hooper, and Salutatorian, Alice Francis.

PTO President, Beth Hand; Jennifer Ludlum, CTAE Director; and UCHS Assistant Principal C.T. Hussion then awarded gold Honor Stoles (57) to those who achieved a Grade Point Average of 90 or above, and had not lost a credit or failed a class.

Hussion then introduced the STAR Student, Alice Francis, and her STAR Teacher, Amy Payne.

This year, Alice and Mrs. Payne were also selected as the Union County School District STAR Representatives. Hussion presented Francis and Payne with a resolution from District 51 State Sen. Steve Gooch, (R-Dahlonega).
