Paris...continued from Page 4A A. The Georgia Legislature passed a law this past legislative session legalizing the sale of fireworks. The law allows counties to adopt their own ordinances related to certain parts of the new law, all of which we do not fully understand yet. We were able to purchase a draft ordinance from a law firm (much less expensive than having our own drafted by attorneys) that will be providing this information to many counties. This resolution that we adopted is to notify the world that we will be adopting an ordinance in the near future, but we cannot adopt it until after the new law takes effect July 1. At this point, the state still has regulations that it must adopt. Then our ordinance will take a minimum of two months after that date to pass because of the statutory time requirements

in adopting a new ordinance.

have eliminated all the added mercury from alkaline batteries. This makes them safe to be thrown away with household garbage and taken to the transfer station. They should not be disposed of by fire because there is a big chance of them exploding. You also have to be careful if the batteries are leaking potassium hydroxide because it can cause chemical burns. Also, be cautious of putting 9 Volt batteries in with your household trash. If the positive and negative ends come in contact with metal or with another battery, a spark can occur, causing a fire. The best practice is to throw away old batteries in the small package you received the new ones in, or tape them together with the tape covering the terminals. If you have any additional

first start, and to suppress big fires in the most critical and high risk areas. Helitack Crews "Helitack" crews are specially trained in the use of helicopters during fire suppression. Some of the crew are trained to rappel from the helicopter to reach fire in remote locations quickly. Because they can be rapidly deployed, they are often the first to respond to a wildfire.

Smokejumpers - These airborne firefighters parachute from planes to attack wildfires in remote and inaccessible areas when the fire first begins. They are often supported by para-cargo drops of personal gear, food, water, and specialized equipment to help suppress fires.

Engine Crews - Engine crews, which range in size from 3 to 10 firefighters, use 250 to 750 gallons of water and several hundred feet of hose to directly attack wildfires. Some engines carry special equipment to spray foam and chemicals on homes, and other structures to help them resist fire.

Incident Management Teams - These teams consist

of fire experts whose primary responsibility is to develop and implement strategies to suppress wildfires. Members of the team are in charge of providing the food, equipment, transportation, and other goods and services that wildland firefighters

Wildfire "management" is a calculated process where the crews try to move the fire away from things that don't need to burn to places where it can burn things that don't matter and eventually run out of fuel and go out. They don't "put out" those big fires out west, they just manage them into places where they will run out of fuel and stop. Unfortunately homes are sometimes lost, but think of what would happen if these highly trained crews were not between you and the fire.

But, once again he didn't stay long. Just a couple of years later Hiram is listed as purchasing property in Franklin County, Alabama. Hiram settled in Franklin County. Later his grandson, Charlie Newton Baker, became my Great Grandfather. As you can see my family, like yours,

is full of saints, sinners, rogues, patriots, healers, inventors, explorers and settlers.

fortunate in our community. He contacted Mickey Cummings, the County's UGA Agriculture Extension Officer and founding father/director of the Union County Farmers Market about the possibility of farming some of that community garden to share the harvest with local food pantries and food banks. That first year he planted

and harvested 5 rows. This year he has planted 75 tomato plants, a few dozen sweet potato plantings, rows of cabbage, squash and peppers. Just as the school year came to a close, some of our FFA students came to help get this year's garden started. But for the most part, Darrell toils alone in his efforts to bring goodness to the tables of those less fortunate. His efforts are subsidized by donations of plants from local nurseries and farms. There's no expense in chemicals, because the garden is organic.

I share this information with you because as a community, we are generous with our time, our patronage and our hearts. We live here, not just because of the mountain's majestic beauty, but we thrive on the goodness of the people we share life with here in Union County. The Community Garden is an opportunity to grow your own or help Darrell grow nourishing, fresh veggies for those less fortunate. It's not a life long commitment.
