**Steppe: 'Milestones tests** will challenge students'

Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe believes Georgia Milestones is a step in the right direction for school systems in the state of Georgia.

The new system for assessing the progress of Georgia students grades 3-12 takes students in a different direction from CRCT and EOCT testing, Steppe said. Criterion-Referenced

Competency Tests and End Of Course Testing became guessing games with the multiplechoice questions on each.

No longer will Georgia students be playing "Trivial Pursuit," Steppe said.

For example, Steppe believes students will go beyond just knowing that Christopher Columbus discovered America in 1492. He believes they will ask, "Why did Columbus discover America?"

"It's not a bad thing that
