this expense for a long time, but we finally had to. We had already discussed this in a proposal at the last county meeting, and we are now accepting this contract in the amount of \$157,425.

"We re-did the whole Civic Center for \$250,000, other than the roof, a few years ago, but just to do the roof is \$157,000. A notice of award was presented at the May 19 county meeting, and this is just accepting the contract from the company."

The commissioner also approved an agreement between the county and Baker Interactive Services, DBA Baker Audio, for the purposes of 24 hours a day, 365 days per year support for the 911 Dispatch communication systems, at a cost of \$15,249.16

per year.

"We're looking at several different future changes in the 911 center," said the commissioner. "I hope we're pretty close to bringing in texting so that people will be able to access it by texting. Then, we're looking at some mapping and other changes, possibly having to do some computer upgrades, too, but we're in the process of looking at all

"We have two new gazebos on the property this year that they're more than welcome to use, but I have a feeling those will fill up fast, so they might want to get here early that morning and go ahead and stake their spot. We also have plenty of shoreline along the point that anybody is more than welcome to sit on."

With the annual boat parade, Nottely Marina offering beer, bait and boats throughout the summer gives the community a patriotic tradition to celebrate right out on the water.

For those with an appetite for fireworks, Nottely Marina will also be conducting a public fireworks display around 10 p.m. that Saturday, July 2.

eral people voting, but it's usually a smaller turnout,' said Union County Deputy Registrar Diana Nichols.

Mail-out ballots for the Republican Primary Runoff are available at the It should be noted

that those who voted the Democratic ticket in the May 24 election will not be able to vote in the Republican Primary Runoff.

However, voters who did not vote in the May 24 Primary can still vote in this runoff, though they must have been registered in time to have voted in the May 24 Primary in order to vote in the July 26 Runoff.

Also. those who voted Non-Partisan in the May 24 Primary can vote in this runoff as well.

Independent Political Body Candidate qualifying began on Monday, June 27. Residents

to qualify as an Independent or a Political Body Candidate for local office must turn in their Notice of Candidacy to the Union County Board of Elections before Friday, July 1, at noon, in order to have his or her name considered for placement on the General Election Ballot.

Part of the qualifying process for Independent and Political Body Candidates is a petition process requiring each candidate

to have procured petitions containing signatures of at least 5 percent of the voting population. That 5 percent is re-

flective of the number of

registered voters during the last election in which the elected office was filled, which was in 2012. Based on those 2012 totals, the number of signatures required for an Independent or Political

Body Candidate to make successful petition to be added to the General Election Ballot in November is right around 655. Tuesday, July 12, is the deadline to have

the appropriate petitions turned in to the Board of Elections. It is recommended

that those seeking signatures obtain more than actually required, as oftentimes many signatures are considered invalid when being checked by the Union County Board of Registrars for voter registration verification.

"There are always some that are not registered, there are some that are illegible, you can't figure out who they are," said Union County Deputy Registrar Diana Nichols. "There are different reasons, but you always find some that - some of them. the signatures don't match what we have on the cards, and if they don't match, we don't count them."
