Paris...continued from Page 4A play together. They use two of the Tennis Courts at Meeks Park on certain days of the week. Also, they utilize the rubberfloored gym during bad weather and during the winter.

Q. What type equipment is required?

A. You only need the paddle, the ball, a net, and comfortable clothes and shoes.

Q. Is the county going to build Pickleball courts for the new interest in the sport?

A. We are certainly looking into this, but it was not in our future plans or the SPLOST budget. Ŝo, we will have to move slowly on finding the right location and being able to fund it.

Q. Is there an organized group playing this sport in Union County?

A. Yes and they have already met with me. I have already been to Towns County during their most recent tournament to observe the sport. Towns County had about 250 people compete at the tournament they hosted a while back. Recently, Oasis, at the Methodist Church held three classes that taught people how to play Pickleball. About 20-25 people graduated

from each of these classes. Q. Is this sport designed for adults?

A. Anyone can play this sport. Some middle and high schools have incorporated it into their physical education program. My understanding is that it is a great sport for older adults who want to stay active, but it is not as intensive as tennis. It is a very competitive sport, with organized local, regional, and national tournaments.

Q. How much will a Pickleball court cost to build? A. I do not have an exact

figure, but an eight-court facility would probably be in the \$250,000-\$300,000 range.

Q. Is there a place to build a new Pickleball court?

A. That is something that we are considering and looking at options. In building these courts you not only need the room for the courts and in this case, you would need room for parking also. Eight courts would accommodate 32 players, but you need parking for double that many. It will take some time to come up with ideas for a suitable location.

Q. Is it a sport that is "Here to Stay?"

A. I am not sure there is an answer to that question yet, but the excitement around this sport seems to suggest it cer-

terwards. Whenever possible keep cats and dogs indoors from dusk till after midnight when most fireworks have been fired off for the night; if a dog is particularly sensitive to thunder or loud noises ask your vet this week for an appropriate tranquilizer to keep the dog calm, and perhaps keep the dog in a quiet inner room or basement away from windows.

Turning the TV volume up and tuned to a soothing station helps if the pet will be left alone. Livestock that may spook should be in a stable for the night to keep them from harm, and leaving lights on in

the barn may help calm them

Dogs that are chained or penned and never allowed indoors should at least have their collars checked for proper fit and wear and tear (this should be done monthly anyways) and inspect the pen for signs of weakness or digging.

If a pet does get lost at any time of year call Animal Control and local shelters immediately, and if you find a strange animal wandering your area report it as well. Your pets rely on you to keep them safe! Cheryl Malone,

Blairsville when your plants are most vulnerable, will provide the greatest protection. There are also alternatives such as Serenade MAX (a Bacillus subtilis product) and lime sulfur. However, captan is the most effective

treatment currently approved

for use against mummy berry. 4. Maintenance. Though all of these steps greatly reduce the chance of mummy berry infection, they do not guarantee protection. In severe cases, it may take more than one year to completely get rid of the mummies and spores. If you follow all of the steps listed above and still have a mummy berry issue, replace the mulch after pruning and repeat the cycle again.

Sanitation is without a doubt the most important part of preventing this fungal disease from damaging your plants. Even if you spray fungicides appropriately, if mummies are still under your bushes, you are still going to have a mummy berry problem. Blueberry bushes in clean areas will without a doubt be the healthiest.
