Union man charged with kidnapping his wife

A 56-year-old Union County man remains in custody following his arrest for allegedly kidnapping his estranged wife from Union General Hospital on June 21, Union County Sheriff's authorities said.

Union County Sheriff's Office authorities say Ronnie Dale Brown faces five felony charges and one misdemeanor charge resulting from a June 21 incident involving his wife, Debra Brown.

Sheriff's authorities say Ronnie Brown and his estranged wife are going through a divorce.

On June 21, sheriff's reports showed that Ronnie

wife's place of work at Union General Hospital, and at gunpoint, forced her to leave that location in his vehicle.

The incident occurred around 4:30 p.m. on June 21, Union County sheriff's authorities said.

Debra Brown was then taken to a location near Wolf Creek where she was held against her will, Union County arrest warrants and sheriff's

Early voting begins July 9 for all elections

Early voting for the July 31 primary is just around the corner.

Registered voters can head to the Union County Courthouse on July 9 and begin the early voting process.

Voters only have two local issues to cast ballots on.

In the nonpartisan Probate Judge race, Incumbent Dwain Brackett goes head-to-head with political newcomer Barry Weinstein.

Also on the ballot for locals, whether to approve a 1 cent sales tax for regional transportation projects.

The 1 cent increase would make 8 cents collected on each dollar before you head out of the grocery, retail or any other store in Union County.

It also would be a tax on home heating fuel, the first \$5,000 on a vehicle purchase and on over the counter medications at any store or pharmacy. That's just to name a few pitfalls.

The tax would be for a period of 10 years. The Probate Judge's race and the TSPLOST question are on the nonpartisan, Republican and Democratic ballots.

The only contested race on the Democratic ballot is Brackett versus Weinstein.

Of course, the TSPLOST question is asked on the Democratic ballot.

No other contested races are on the Democratic ballot.

There are four straw poll questions on the Democratic ballot.

First, should the Constitution be amended to allow the state to override locally-elected school boards' decisions when it comes to creation of charter schools in the county or the city.

The second question, should Georgia end the practice of permitting unlimited gifts from lobbyists to Georgia lawmakers.

The third question asks if Georgia should adopt an income tax credit for home

Union County hosts Clerks training

The Union County Courthouse and Judge Dwain Brackett, hosted a training session for Probate Judge Clerks last week.

Judge Brackett has served on the Probate Judge Training Council since 2005 and is the representative from the 10-county district, that includes Union County.

"Those of us on the training council determine the training clerks training and certification program and I've been an active part of that," Judge Brackett said.

"The training council decided five years ago that training the clerks is very im-

portant because every year guardianship laws, so they need updated training like the judges do. You've got to stay on top of those updates and those changes or you'll end up behind the curve."

The training sessions are held regionally since it's difficult for smaller counties, like Union, who only have three employees, to send them outside of Northeast Georgia.

"The problem is with a lot of small counties, we don't have many employees. I only have three while Gwinnett County has 15," Judge Brackett said.

"It's hard to turn my people loose off to Savannah
