Surrounded by family and friends, Cummings went out in style at a party thrown by his colleagues in the Union County Extension Office on Tuesday at the Pat Haralson Memorial Civic Center.

In the years approaching his retirement, Cummings said that people had started asking him if he was looking

"I've been working for 33 years in Extension, and when I went to work, all those old-timers like I am now, they always kept talking about
