take the project to bid in April and have it open in June. However, the plans were delayed because of equipment changes. Once we were unable to build the splash pad prior to the pool opening, it became impossible to complete the project this season. The construction zone will include part of the pool area, and this would not be safe with small children and construction equipment. We could either delay the construction of the splash pad or we could have the pool closed the majority of the summer so we just chose to delay the construction.

Q. When will the splash pad be built?

A. We are close to having the final plans redone and completed. We will have to put the

project out to bid and advertising will take a couple of months. So we still hope to have the construction done this year, at least part of it, and then have it ready to open when the pool opens in the spring. Yeah!

Q. What is a splash pad?

A. This will be a 5,110 square foot area of small fountains, bucket dumps and other assorted water spray areas for the enjoyment of tots, probably up to pre-school age. It will also have a small area for mothers and the kids to enjoy about 6" of water to wade and sit in. It will be lots of fun and I am very excited at the prospects of having this completed. This will be funded with SPLOST dollars.

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When considering other information that has become public in recent months, I was not surprised to find that the Board of Directors of the Cooperative has violated its Policy (Bulletin No. 540) that prohibits the organization from making loans to employees or directors for any purpose.

Cooperative loans to a least five current or former board members ranging in amounts from \$45,591 to \$1,329 are listed on the 990 forms filed with the IRS in each of those three fiscal years. None of the loans have been paid and are not judged to be in default, thus the Cooperative's Board of Directors who borrowed money currently owe \$65,399 in unpaid debts to the membership.

This abuse of authority is yet another reason why members should be deeply concerned about the incompetency of the Board and manager of the EMC. I hope other EMC stakeholders will join me by defeating the current board members who are seeking reelection in September and replacing them with candidates who will work to make the cooperative more transparent and more businesslike.
