Five qualify for EMC Board of Directors races

The names on the petition ballots of five potential candidates for three seats on the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC board of directors have been verified as EMC members, EMC Director Steven Phillips said.

In Union County, Mickey Cummings, Patrick Malone and Charles Rich have made the ballot, Phillips said.

In Towns County, Roy Perren made the ballot; and in Fannin County, Larry Williams made the ballot.

Williams is the only

candidate in the Fannin County race. Incumbent Chair William Prather opted not to run again, Phillips said. With Williams unop-

posed, it means at least two new directors will join the board of directors after the election results become public at the EMC's annual meeting

There is no incumbent in the Union County race, so

Henson opted out of submitting his petition to be on the ballot in Union County. He threw his support behind Cummings and asked his supporters to vote for Cummings.

Lt. Gov. Cagle is slated as the guest speaker at the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce's Power Lunch on Aug. 18 at 11:45 a.m. at the Union County Community Center. Park Sterling Bank

Lt. Gov. Cagle's political career is almost unparalleled. In 1994, Cagle, then 28, became the youngest member of the Georgia State Senate by defeating Incumbent Democrat Jane Hemmer. His victory signaled a Republican revolution in Hall County as

long-time Democratic incumbents fell one-by-one to their Republican counterparts.

In 2006, State Sen. Cagle made history once again, becoming Georgia's first Republican lieutenant governor by defeating Democrat and former state representative Jim Martin. Cagle currently is
