## Five qualify for EMC Board of Directors races

The names on the petition ballots of five potential candidates for three seats on the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC board of directors have been verified as EMC members, EMC Director Steven Phillips said.

In Union County, Mickey Cummings, Patrick Malone and Charles Rich have made the ballot, Phillips said.

In Towns County, Roy Perren made the ballot; and in Fannin County, Larry Williams made the ballot.

Williams is the only candidate in the Fannin County race. Incumbent Chair William Prather opted not to run again, Phillips said.

With Williams unopposed, it means at least two new directors will join the board of directors after the election results become public at the EMC's annual meeting in September.

There is no incumbent in the Union County race, so

Cummings, Malone or Rich will join the board of directors depending on election results.

In Towns County, Perren will face incumbent Di-

rector Jerry Nichols on the ballot.

"All the petition candidates that submitted petitions are on the ballot," Phillips

said. "You do know that Danny Henson did not submit a petition for verification."

Henson opted out of submitting his petition to be on the ballot in Union County. He threw his support behind Cummings and asked his supporters to vote for Cummings.

Phillips said there are three different ways to vote this year.

First, the EMC will mail out paper ballots with the August electric bills. Second, members can vote online, and third, members can See EMC, Page 2A

## Lt. Gov. Cagle coming to Blairsville on Aug. 18 to speak at Power Lunch

Georgia's Lt. Gov. Casey Cagle is coming to Blairsville.

Lt. Gov. Cagle is slated as the guest speaker at the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce's Power Lunch on Aug. 18 at 11:45 a.m. at the Union County Community Center.

Park Sterling Bank sponsors the event.

Lt. Gov. Cagle's political career is almost unparalleled. In 1994, Cagle, then 28, became the youngest member of the Georgia State Senate by defeating Incumbent Democrat Jane Hemmer. His victory signaled a Republican revolution in Hall County as

long-time Democratic incumbents fell one-by-one to their Republican counterparts.

In 2006, State Sen. Cagle made history once again, becoming Georgia's first Republican lieutenant governor by defeating Democrat and former state representative Jim Martin. Cagle currently is

Attention all 4-year-olds: if you or your parents would like to be considered for Georgia's Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten Program through Union County Schools, now is the time to be added to the waiting list.

"As the new school year approaches, there are always unavoidable changes including family moves that will ultimately open up seats in the program," said Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Stepe.

Pre-K meets for regular school hours, and the program is conducted by four certified



teachers, each with their own paraprofessional.

There is no cost associated with Pre-K, and getting on the waiting list does not guar-

antee placement in the program - but spots are likely to become available and are first come, first served.

Prospective students

must have turned 4 years of age on or before Sept. 1.

## Neighbor's sharp eye leads to burglary arrest

A 32-year-old Union County man has been arrested and charged with second-degree burglary earlier this month, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.

John David Purvis is charged with breaking into a store at Pappy's Plaza on U.S. 129, Union County SSgt. Daren Osborn said.

Deputies developed leads on a suspect rather quickly, SSgt. Osborn said.

"It was a part-time employee," Osborn said. "He did odd jobs here and there for the owners."

Purvis is believed to have taken approximately \$2,400 in merchandise from the store, SSgt. Osborn said.

Union County sheriff's Deputy Lamar Dyer took the case and went with other

deputies to Purvis' home. He noticed several items at the Purvis' residence that were taken during the burglary at the store, SSgt. Osborn said.

"They knocked at the door, identified themselves, but no one would come to the door," Osborn said. "Deputies contained the residence and Lamar went and obtained
