require water/sewer or electricity connections; (3) Structures that exceed 150 square feet; (4) any structure in a state mandated stream buffer; (5) additions/repairs to structural, electrical, gas piping, mechanical, or plumbing systems. Some of these examples are: commercial buildings, residential buildings, location of a mobile home, location of a travel trailer used as a full time residence, seasonal or part time residence, garage, carport, completion of any unfinished areas within a residence or building. Boat docks

also require a permit. Q. What projects do

not require a permit? A. If you want to change your roofing material, this does not require a permit. Neither does an exterior siding change, replacement of floor covering, painting, wallpapering, or sidewalks or driveways.

Q. If I get a permit, how long is it good for? A. Building permits are

only valid for one year, after which a renewal permit is re-

the bouquet we presented her, and quickly found an appropriate vase to display it. Then we'd go out to the vard and lay in the shade, blowing the aged dandelion flowers from their stems, pretending that the white fuzzy seeds were fairy dust, making wishes with each puff.

"One government official, speaking on condition of anonymity, pointed out that "None of these people would have been killed had the Extremists obeyed the law and turned over their weapons voluntarily.

"Government troops initially succeeded in confiscating a large supply of outlawed weapons and ammunition. However, troops attempting to seize arms and ammunition in Lexington met with resistance from heavily-armed Extremists who had been tipped off regarding the government's plans.

"During a tense standoff in the Lexington town park, National Guard Colonel, Francis Smith, commander of the government operation, ordered the armed group to surrender and return to their homes. The impasse was broken by a single shot, which was reportedly fired by one of the

right-wing Extremists. "Eight civilians were killed in the ensuing gunfire.

"Ironically, the local citizenry blamed government forces rather than the Extremists for the civilian deaths. Before order could be restored, armed citizens from surrounding areas had de-Bess.") scended upon the Guard units. Colonel Smith, finding his forces Blairsville

over-matched by the armed mob, ordered a retreat.

"Governor Gage has called upon citizens to support the state/national joint task force in its effort to restore law and order. The governor also demanded the surrender of those responsible for planning and leading the attack against the government troops.

"Samuel Adams, Paul Revere and John Hancock, who have been identified as "ringleaders" of the Extremist faction, remain at large ....

.. and this, fellow Americans, is how the American Revolution began on the morning of April 19, 1775

On July 4th, 1776, at great personal risk, these same "extremists" signed the Declaration of Independence, pledging to each other and their countrymen their "lives, fortunes, and sacred honor."
