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Flags raised at Major Davenport Veterans Center

Seven recently installed flags at the Maj. Davenport Veterans Center received a warm dedication on Friday, July 29, and now, eight flags fly high above the center each morning.

Veterans, officials, family and friends gathered from Blairsville and the surrounding areas to take part in the mesmerizing ceremony, meant not only to dedicate those veterans that each flag represents, and all of the sacrifices that have been made in the name of freedom.

"Union County and all of the North Georgia mountain area has a very large influence of veterans and veterans' families that live up here, as well as across the state

of Georgia," said Vietnam Veteran Ron Schott. "We felt that as a collective group of veterans' organizations, it was only fitting and proper that we dress up the front of the building."

"We wanted to give recognition to each of the branches of service that provided protection and recognition to the United States of America. That is why we've decided to bring about these flags, and the American flag."

The first of the eight flags to rise into the air was the black POW flag.

Vietnam Veteran and Rev. Bill Honaker read aloud a poem to war who those Prisoners of War who are still missing, those who never found their way home, and those who did come home, and who will carry the memories of captivity for the rest of


their lives.

The Union County High School Band led a drum roll before the raising of each flag, followed by the anthem of each specific branch. The U.S. Coast Guard flag followed the POW flag, which was in turn followed by flags of the U.S. Air Force, the U.S. Navy, the U.S. Marine Corps, the U.S. Army and the Georgia State flag.

As the wind blew the seven flags high above the crowd, a silence swept across the dozens of people gathered for the event. Hands raised in salute or lifted solemnly to cover hearts, and the band played "The Star-Spangled Banner" as the American flag found her place among the rest, blowing in the breeze.

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UCSO working hard to combat methamphetamine

Investigators with the Union County Sheriff's Office have been hitting the streets hard and heavy in their attempts to keep meth out of the county.

"The sad thing is, we lock 10 up for distribution of methamphetamine - within three months, 10 more have taken their place," said UCSO

Detective Sgt. Tyler Miller.

Added UCSO Capt. Chad Deyton: "And it's not necessarily just Union County that's overrun with it - everywhere is getting beat up by it."

On Tuesday, July 26, UCSO investigators arrested the following individuals connected with a recently established meth ring originating out of the Atlanta area, according to the

sheriff's office:

Jeremy Lee of Young Harris, five counts distribution of methamphetamine, possession of controlled substance with intent to distribute, two counts possession of controlled substance, use of communications in committing or facilitating a drug transaction.

Jacob Sawyer of Lawrenceville, possession of

controlled substance with intent to distribute, possession of marijuana less than 1 ounce.

Jacob Lee, three counts distribution of methamphetamine, one count fleeing or attempting to elude police, two counts obstructing or hindering law enforcement officers.

Jason Stepp, distribution of methamphetamine,
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
