## Panther fans receive a taste of things to come this fall

Football fans were given a glimpse of the 2015 edition of Union County Panthers football last Friday night at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium.

The Holy Innocents Bears, who hail from Atlanta, made the trip to the mountains for a scrimmage contest between a pair of squads from Class AA.

The rules of the contest were very different from a normal game. In the scrimmage, each offense began at the 30-yard line and was given 6 minutes to do as they pleased.

During the allotted time, down and distance were kept and each team could score or punt as often as possible. They would continue to take over back at the 30-yard line each time until their 6 minutes

Different variations in time and the yard line were used throughout the game, but each team possessed the ball an equal number of minutes.

Holy Innocents was awarded the ball first, starting from their own 30-yard line but the Panthers defense was very stingy in the first six minutes. They forced a 3-and-out and a punt on the Bears first series. Union recovered a fumble on Holy Innocents' second series, and forced another 3-and-out on the third series when their 6 minutes ran out. When it was the Pan-

thers turn to play offense for 6 minutes, they gave up a sack and then an attempted screen pass went the other way for a


With more than 3 minutes remaining, the Panthers moved into Bears' territory but were denied on a 4th and 1.

On their third series, senior quarterback Joseph Man cuso completed passes to junior Bo Lynch and senior Sam Gilbert, getting the offense on

At the Holy Innocents' 25-yard line, another sack derailed the Union drive. However, the Panthers were able to get into field goal range with an 11-yard completion to Gilbert and a 9-yard carry by Mancuso, that allowed Knox Kiernan to Panthers' possession.


"We dropped a few balls Chris Drost in the final minute that side of the ball but Knox

On Mancuso's final series of the game, the Panthers moved into Holy Innocents' territory, setting up a 38-yard field goal by Kiernan.

Wright, who started the game at receiver, moved to quarterback, and used his legs to convert a 3rd and 7, then connected with senior Andrew Brown for seven more yards. A first down carry by Rodriguez and an offsides penalty put the Panthers back into field goal range, but this time, Kiernan's kick sailed wide left from 45

### Lady Panthers rout Dawson, Commerce; hold their own vs Class AAAAAA

The Lady Panthers opened the 2015 campaign by splitting four games at the Lanier Point Invitational Tournament in Gainesville over the weekend. Union picked up two lopsided wins over Dawson County (Class AAA) and Commerce (Class A) and were competitive in two losses against Class AAAAAA - the State's highest classification.

On Friday, Union County opened with North Forsyth from Class AAAAAA and fell 3-1, thanks in large part to a nine-strikeout performance from the Lady Raiders pitch-

The Lady Panthers got back on track with a 13-1 rout of former Region 8-AA rival Dawson County. Union batted around in the fifth – bringing seven runs across and ending

the game via mercy rule. The bats remained hot as Union put away Commerce 10-1 in a game that was also called after five innings.

In the finale, the Lady Panthers jumped out to a 3-1 advantage over Johns Creek from Class AAAAAA but the Lady Gladiators scored two in the third and four in the fifth to take a 7-4 victory.

On tap this week for Union County is another former Region-rival, Fannin County, who visits Blairsville on Tuesday at 5:55 p.m. On Wednesday, the Lady Panthers face another Class AAAAAA school when Habersham Central comes calling at 5 p.m.
