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New equipment reaches Union County firefighters

Union County has gotten that much safer, thanks to the acquisition of 76 new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatuses by the Union County Fire Department.

The Avon Protection Deltair SCBAs boast an improved 45 minutes of air supply while conducting low oxygen search and rescue and fire suppression operations, compared to the older air packs that were in use, which could only hold about 20 minutes worth of air.

Delivered earlier this month, the up-to-date SCBAs are currently on every single fire engine in the county.

Blairsville Police Officer Dustin Walker doesn't profess to be a snake handler or a snake charmer.

Well, you could have fooled the folks in the drivethru at Union Community Bank's main branch last week.

Walker, a four-year veteran of the Blairsville Police Department and a part-time Union County Sheriff's deputy, came to the rescue following a dispatch call to the UCB drive-thru.

The call came in Tuesday around 2 p.m.

"A call came in that there was a timber rattler in the drive-thru at the bank." Officer Walker said. "We get snake calls all the time, everyone thinks they've seen a copperhead or a rattlesnake, but, it's usually just a black snake. "Well, this time, it was

a rattlesnake," he said. "It surprised me that it was a rattlesnake right here in the middle of town.

When Officer Walker arrived, the snake had made its

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Alone series finale Thursday, 10 p.m.

Blairsville's Alan Kay is one step away from \$500,000.

Kay, 40, a corrections officer at Colwell Probation Detention Center in Blairsville, is one of two final survivors on the History Channel series Alone.

The final episode airs Thursday at 10 p.m. on the History Channel.

Labeled as the country's boldest and longest survival experiment ever captured for television, Alone has aired ever Thursday, at 10 p.m. since June 18.

Sam Larson, a 22-yearold customer relations representative from Lincoln, Neb. is the other lone survivalist.

The 10-episode series put 10 hardcore survivalists alone in the Vancouver Island wilderness - no camera crew, no teams, and no producers - on a single mission to stay alive. At stake - \$500,000 awarded to the person who can last the longest. Carrying only what they can fit in a backpack, the survivalists are completely

separated from one another in harsh, unforgiving terrain to hunt, build shelters and fend off predators. They have faced extreme isolation and psychological distress as they plunged into the unknown, self-documenting their experience

this year. "You play it just like regular golf, but instead of using a golf ball and a club, you use a special kind of Frisbee," said Benfield. "You've got putters, midranges, fairways and drivers on the discs, and each disc does a certain thing. Some go straight and some curve at the end. You basically just tee off, you throw the disc, and wherever it lands, you throw it again until you make it into the basket.'

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Blairsville couple charged with fraudulently obtaining drugs

A Blairsville couple has been arrested and charged with almost a dozen counts each of fraudulently obtaining controlled substances.

Lois Taylor, 50, and Gilbert Taylor, 56 were arrested last week following an extended investigation by the Union County Narcotics Squad, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.

"Both been charged with 10 counts of fraudulently obtaining controlled sub-stance," Sheriff Mason said. "The controlled substances obtained were oxycodone and hydrocodone. Both Gilbert and Lois were employees at the Vantage Oncology office located here in Union County.

"The investigation showed that both Gilbert and Lois Taylor were picking up forged prescriptions," Sheriff Mason said. "This investigation has uncovered numerous other counts of fraudulently obtaining controlled substances made by both Gilbert and Lois Taylor which will

Cummings added that Arrowood's biscuits are the best he's ever had - better than his grandmother's, and he loved those.

"They're just homemade," said Arrowood on the secret to her biscuits. "They're not out of a bag or anything, we just do them in a bowl the

old-timey way. There's an in-gredient - if you don't have the love that you put in them, they're no good.

Arrowood and Cummings have yet to come up with a name for the Farmers Market restaurant, but
