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## Second scrimmage contest a learning experience for Panthers

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Following Friday night's home scrimmage matchup with Sonoraville High School, Union County Head Coach Brian Allison reminded his team that they still have a long way to go.

And, according to Allison, the Phoenix, from Class AAA, are on a much higher level than the Holy Innocents squad that his squad faced the previous week.

With no official score being kept, the final tally depended on who you asked, and whether they were wearing red or purple. According to the Calhoun

Times, the newspaper providing Sonoroaville coverage, the final score was 20-16, in favor of the Phoenix. However, ask anyone from Union County and they will tell you the final score was Sonoraville 17, Union County 16.

The scoring discrepancy boils down to a Phoenix field goal with 7:13 to play in the second

The first attempt failed when the snap sailed high and the holder tried to take of running, but the play was immediately blown dead, and being a practice game, Sonoraville was allowed another chance and kicker Kevin Villatoro split the uprights from 29 yards out. Unfortunately, the Pan-

thers offense, particularly the aerial attack, sputtered during the first half as a result of the Phoenix getting pressure on Union quarterback Joseph Mancuso.

And the senior QB didn't get much help from a receiving corp that combined for seven dropped passes on the night.

"They put some pressure on us in some situations and it hurt us in the passing game,' Coach Allison said. "We also had a few drops but (Mancuso) was still 15-for-24 which is (a completion percentage of) about 62-to-63 percent which isn't bad. It's not where we want it to be but it isn't bad."

Union was unable to get on the board until senior Knox Kiernan connected on a 27-yard field goal with 39 seconds remaining in the first half.

The Phoenix offense opened the game at their own 30-yard line and were on the move into Union territory until junior defensive lineman Luke

pass. After a 7-yard carry on 3rd-and-8, seniors Chris Drist and Tyler McCoy got to the Phoenix's senior quarterback Cody Long. The combined sack resulted in a noraville territory. 7-yard loss and a 4th-and-15.

Daniel broke up the fourth down pass attempt - giving the ball to

Union at their own 30-yard line. a loss of down so facing 2nd-

Winkler batted down a first down Mancuso quickly went to work, hitting fellow senior Sam Gilbert second down, Sonoraville was for a gain of 12 yards. A 3-yard whistled for a false start. Facing a carry by junior running back Bo Lynch and an 9-yard completion to sophomore receiver Cole Wright moved Union into So-

On first down, a 15-yard Senior defensive back Josh pass to Gilbert was brought back due to a penalty.

The flag also resulted in

the backfield for a 4-yard loss, on 3rd and forever, Gilbert picked up 6-yards with a reception. A delay of game derailed the drive even further and following a 10-yard completion to Gilbert, the Panthers were forced to punt.

With 5:03 to play in the opening quarter, the Phoenix set up shop at their own 30 and after sacks by Drost and sophomore RJ Banton and a holding call brought on another punt.

Starting at their own 40. Mancuso went back to Gilbert for 12 yards on 2nd-and-10, but a sack and two incompletions followed bringing up another punting situation at the close of the period.

Starting the second frame at their own 39, Sonoraville used rushes of 10, 18, 12 to get inside the Union redzone where the drive stalled at the 12-yard line resulting in two Phoenix field goal attempts, with the second one connecting, thanks to an accurate snap.

The drive also cost the visitors their starting quarterback when Long, a 2014 All Region 6-AAA Honorable Mention selection went down with a leg injury, forcing him to watch the remainder of the game on crutches

Beginning at their own 30 with 7:13 left before halftime, the Panthers' offense was behind the chains again when they lost 10 Senior quarterback Joseph and-25, Lynch was wrapped up in yards on a first down sack, two

incompletions followed, bringing Banton back on the field to punt the ball away.

"I think our punting situation can be good, we're just not consistent," Coach Allison said. 'RJ (Banton) has a good leg he'll kick it 25-30 yards with no return on it.'

Starting at their own 45, the Phoenix, who went on to churn out 233 yards of offense on the ground, carried for 8 yards then 2 yards before losing 10 yards after they were forced to recover their own fumble. Facing 2nd-and-20, Sonoraville gashed Union for a 39-yard run to the 16-yard line. A 12-yard carry and a 4-yard touchdown run off the right tackle followed.

"I don't think we tackled very well and I think that probably hurt us more than anything,' Coach Allison said. "Actually, (our run defense) was a little bit better than it looked on Friday night. We were messing around with a different look on the defensive front and we were just out of position in a few situations. We, as coaches, put our kids into some positions that weren't very conducive for success."

With 3:41 to work with in the half, the Panthers' offense was finally able to gain a little

Mancuso spread the ball around to Gilbert, Wright, Kiernan, and junior Slade Thompson

Carries by junior Nic Rodriguez and sophomore Cole Dockrey kept the drive alive. But facing a 4th-and-2, Mancuso hit Kiernan on a seam route that went

for 15 yards. Then Mancuso hooked up with Thompson on consecutive plays - good for 8 yards and 6 ards. An offsides penalty gave Union a 1st-and-5 at the Phoenix 13-yard line and Dockrey rushed for 3 yards to make it 2nd-and-2. That's when the drive stalled and Kiernan nailed a 27-yard field goal right before the half.

'I feel pretty confident with our special teams at this point," Coach Allison said. Knox (Kiernan) has been kicking the ball really well. He put it into the endzone a couple of times on kickoffs and his leg is stronger than it was last year and he's also more accurate.'

The second half began with a 5-yard carry and a 5-yard reception by Lynch, then junior Zach Stone took a sweep around the right end for 12 yards. The drive stalled when the Panthers lost yardage recovering their own

Luckily, Sonoraville coughed up the football and senior safety Andrew Brown pounced on the loose football at midfield. On the ensuing series, Brown was inserted at receiver and reeled in a Mancuso pass, to put the home team on the See Challenge, Page 15A

After Union County used an 8-run third inning to put away Fannin County, junior Laken Chambers and senior Maddie Garrett went deep during the win over Class AAAAAA's Habersham, with Chambers throwing a complete game, three-hitter for her third win of the season.

The Lady Panthers stranded another runner in the bottom half of the third inning after junior Kendra Tanner lined an opposite field double with one


