added just to try to clean out the road ditches and culverts after a spring and summer of constant heavy rains. I want to especially thank our mowing crew and our new ditch clearing crew. We are going countywide and trying to keep up with the rain in cleaning out ditches and culverts and keeping as much of the vegetation mowed and chopped down. It is a huge job, and often after we complete cleaning a ditch, the next day they are washed out again, but they keep working. The mowing crew has never had this amount of problems with fallen trees, weeds causing sight distant problems at many intersections and vegetation growing and covering county roads like never before with all the rain.

In 2012, we removed 160 fallen trees from roads all over the county. This year, we have already removed 111 trees and on pace to have nearly 200.

Q. What are all the duties of the Road Department?

A. This is tough, but here goes. First, they take all county complaint phone calls and generate a work order for every call for service. You will find very few if any counties that maintain a full-time person on the telephone just to be available to the public for calls. Then dispatch the work out to the appropriate county crews. These include, especially this year, clearing gravel off paved roads washed from the heavy rains, cleaning ditches and culverts, improving driveway entrances, replacing the hundreds of street signs vandalized each year, and of course mowing over 1,200 miles of

road R/W and patching and paving over 10 miles of roads each year. Also, grading and improving road banks and sight distance where needed, assisting the county work crews with many projects including directing traffic at all parades and the Farmers Market and festivals, and cutting trees fallen in county roads. In times of floods or other natural disasters, the Road Department is always there to help the county residents. Many of you have your own stories of how the Road Department has assisted you in time of need and I hear them often and always pass them along to the Road Department. Union County is blessed to have so many hard working employees and you will find them in all county departments. A special thanks goes to the Road Department for all they do to make Union County one of the best counties in which to live, not only in Georgia, but anywhere.

Q. How does the county pay for all of this extraordinary service we receive from the Union County Road Department?

A. Without the SPLOST sales tax, this level of service would be absolutely impossible.

Approximately \$1.1 million per year goes into our road department from property taxes and our general budget, and an additional \$825,000 is paid by SPLOST. In addition, we receive about \$500,000 per year from the State GDOT for road resurfacing.

Equipment purchases are also included within these numbers. Every dollar is needed and necessary to continue this service.

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and future (or current) demands are identified, the Council will determine which water and land use management practices should be employed to ensure there is sufficient water and assimilative capacity to meet future needs. EPD will use computer models to test the ability of the recommended practices to close any identified "gaps."

The Coosa-North Georgia water planning region borders other regions or shares surface or groundwater resources with other regions; therefore, the Coosa-North Georgia Council will communicate and coordinate with adjacent, upstream and/or downstream councils as well as EPD to ensure the appropriateness of the recommended management practices.

EPD and the Coosa-North Georgia Council will use an iterative process of recommendation and modeling, to arrive at a set of management practices to meet the Region's future needs. The Coosa-North Georgia Council submitted the Initial Recommended Regional Water Plan for the Coosa-North Georgia Region to EPD, which was available for public review and comment May - July 2011. The Coosa-North Georgia Council considered comments made on the plan, and made the necessary and/or appropriate changes. The plan was re-submitted to EPD on Sept. 30, 2011, and was officially adopted by the director on Nov. 15, 2011. Now that the Regional Plan is adopted, all EPD water permits and Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority (GEFA) grants and loans for water projects will be guided by the Plan.
