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Board apologizes to BRMEMC members; actions taken and considered

Minor Report: 'Taylor breached duty of loyalty; Akins made false reports to Internal Revenue Service'

A \$30,000 internal report on the long over due debt of former BRMEMC Board President shows Terry Taylor violated his duty of loyalty as

The report by attorney Steven Minor and obtained by the North Georgia News and Towns County Herald shows Taylor breached his duty of loyalty, similar to an oath of office, by allowing himself to receive an undisclosed, improper benefit from BRMEMC.

Also, the report shows that Taylor was not eligible to serve as a director during his debt crisis because to be a director "compliance with payment obligations is required to be a member in good stand-"Mr. Taylor's eligibility

as a director was predicated upon his individual membership based on service to his home. This account also began to have unpaid bills between March 2009 and March 2011, reaching a maximum total of \$4,267.18," Minor wrote in his report.

According to Minor, the legal duties of an EMC director are to discharge his or her duties as a director, including duties as a member of a committee - in good faith, and with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances. The statutory

outline of two different duties commonly associated with a director's fiduciary duty is the duty of loyalty and the duty of care, the former was violated by Taylor, Minor reported.

Meanwhile, Minor's report shows that Taylor's debt should have been disclosed on IRS Form 990.

The debt on Mr. Taylor's residential account... should probably have been disclosed on (IRS) Form 990 as a loan," Minor reports. "Additionally, because the Quarry (Taylor and Taylor Construction) was a disqualified person as defined in (IRS) Form 990 for these years, (and possibly others)...it should have been treated as 'others receivables,' and this would still require disclosure on Part X items 5 and 6 of (IRS) Form 990.

This would have required the exact amounts of the debts to have been item-



According to Minor's re-

port, an omission on the Internal Revenue Service Form 990 can result in a fine of \$100 per day during which such failure continues, with the maximum fine not exceeding \$50,000.

"Mr. Akins is listed as signing all three Form 990s (years ending 2012, 2011 and 2010) that are on GuideStar. The signature block states 'under penalties of perjury, I declare that I have examined this return, including accompanying schedules and statements, and to the best of my knowledge and belief, it is true, correct and complete.' Mr. Akins had full knowledge of the outstanding account at the Quarry, and thus signing the (IRS) Forms 990 as submitted, Minor reported. Minor suggested that

Minor's report also recommends the Board revise the Whistleblower Policy to allow more flexibility in reporting and possibly to engage an independent, third party vendor of whistleblower reporting services to allow that an anonymous report can always be filed with an independent party who is in a position to address concerns.

The long overdue debt of Taylor and Taylor Construction was first reported to board member Greg Owenby by former EMC Director of Operations Chris Kelley.

Kelley's reward was a demotion, a significant pay cut and personnel reprimands

that included being cited for insubordination, the newspapers have learned.

Kelley resigned his position at BRMEMC last week. the newspapers have learned.

Board Member Owenby recalls a vague reference about the debt in August 2013 from Kelley, according to Minor's report.

"Mr. Owenby didn't recall being informed of the specifics until a meeting with Mr. Kelley sometime subsequent to March 13, when Mr. Kelley presented Mr. Owenby with a document, which specifically showed the existence of the debt," Minor reported.

This led Mr. Owenby to contact (Board Member) Mr. (Bill) Prather, who contacted Mr. Akins. Mr. Akins confirmed the existence of the debt and this ultimately resulted in the disclosure to the entire Board of Directors at the next board meeting (April 8)," Minor reported.

Prather recalled a meeting with Kelley sometime in 2011 or 2012, where Kelley apparently made "some vague reference" to Akins not informing the board of certain "bookkeeping matters," Minor reported.

'Mr. Prather said that he didn't believe this was a reference to the incidents (Taylor's debt)," Minor reported.

Kelley told Minor he didn't remember speaking with Prather "in which he discussed, expressly or implic-

Paris explains county's property tax increase By Shawn Jarrard

Union County Commissioner Lamar Paris made a good case for increasing property taxes last week.

The proposed increase would raise the county millage rate from 5.408 to 5.890, and Paris admits that the information can be confusing.

"Property taxes are basically paid in arrears," said Commissioner Paris. "The tax bill you'll hopefully be getting the first of September, it will be for the 2014 year taxes, but they fund the 2015 year budget."

Paris created packets complete with colored charts for citizens to review, favorably comparing Union County to similarly sized counties in the area. Various types of charts, including bar graphs and pie charts, helped to bridge the gap between ease of understanding and the bureaucracy of the numbers.

"Everything is done in the form of millage rates, so that's how we determine property tax," said Commis-sioner Paris. "If your taxes are


