The smaller room will be primarily used for our Alzheimer's Respite program, which we will be expanding to two days a week when the room is completed. We are in our third year with a very successful Respite Program. This program allows the caregiver's of Alzheimer's patients to have a few hours to shop for groceries, go to the doctor or just have some free time for themselves.

Q. Is the Senior Center just another government program that is not need-

A. Absolutely not!! It is a fine example of what is good about Federal and State government, which is providing a service to those who need it and who are unable to provide it for themselves. There are 35 ancient steps, designed for a gate much different than mine, leading to the apartment. You climb the steps to go into shops, you climb the wall to walk the promenade (that you had to walk to in order to walk some more). I keep looking at my legs to see if they are transforming into Betty Grable's gams. It's not going to happen.

We decide we need a bus schedule. We take two steps up to the entrance of the bus station. The clerks in attendance are behind glass, consulting with you through a vent, in what seemingly is the size of a bung hole. We try to not assume that everyone speaks English, though most have a comprehension of the language. This time we didn't ask, but plowed ahead, arrogant Americans, asking the middle aged frumpy woman behind the protective shield, for a bus schedule. "Naw, Naw, Naw", shaking her head vehemently. She points in the direction of the Information Center, from whence we just came. We explain that they sent us to her. She now delivers us a diatribe she spits out in Italian, faster than the speed of light, and with all the sour-

ness of a bag of lemon drops. We head back over to the Information Center, feel-

ing violated. The center has now cleared of tourists, and both attendants, who willingly sit behind a counter without protective glass, give us their full attention. We spill our story of the verbal battering we just incurred and they were sympathetic, explaining that we had the misfortune of meeting up with the "not so pleasant" clerk. I then used an Italian expression that my family would tease one another with when one was in a nasty mood. "Faccia brutta" I called her. Ugly face is the translation. Both the tourism ladies laughed out loud. I've been practicing my Italian at home for months, but my "level one" expertise has been of little use to me, here. I've been discouraged, until this moment, in this tourismo centre. I realize that I have garnered enough skill to entertain someone. I will keep practicing, moving on to level two.

Unfortunately, I do not have the luxury of enjoying Lucca for the entire month. I will be back to the Union County Farmers Market this weekend, in time to oversee the "Chef's Cook-off". Five local chefs will each be presenting two dishes. One dish must feature potatoes from our market, and one will be prepared with our local sweet green peppers.
