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Union County teen killed in Fannin crash

A 16-year-old Union County boy was killed in a one-vehicle crash in Fannin County the day after Christmas, according to the the Georgia State Patrol.

Cody Dwayne Morgan, a junior home school student, who had attended Union County High School, died from injuries sustained in the one vehicle crash, according to the Georgia State Patrol's Post 27 in Blue Ridge.

The accident occurred Dec. 26th shortly after noon, patrol officials said.

Morgan was driving a Ford pickup truck, traveling south on Skeenah Gap Road, patrol officials said.

As Morgan negotiated a curve, the Ford pickup he was driving traveled off the

embankment, and overturned, patrol officials said. Morgan, who was not

wearing his seat belt, was ejected and suffered lifethreatening injuries, patrol officials said. Morgan's passenger, 15-

year-old Cecil Brian Greenway, suffered abrasions to his chest and arms and was transported to Union General Hospital, patrol officials said. Morgan was pronounced

dead at the accident scene, patrol officials said. According to friends,

Morgan was a young person full of life. He loved to hunt, fish, and shoot pool. He also had a passion for riding horses. Morgan also was a hard worker, always helping his father when the need arose. He was a young man

destined to be a life-long local resident and contributor to the

All that youthful exuberance came to a halt on Dec. 26 near Skeenah Gap.

Cody Morgan is survived by his parents, Joe and Myra Morgan of Blairsville, sister, Kristen Morgan of Morgan of Blairsville, paternal grandparents, the Rev. Wayne and Jewel Morgan of Blairsville, maternal grand-parents, Wilbur and Nancy Morgan of Fayetteville. Also, he is survived by numerous aunts, uncles and cousins, and a host of friends.

Funeral services were held Saturday, Dec. 29th, at Mountain View Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Eric Davenport and Minister Terry Stuart officiating. Graveside services fol-

One of the first issues the Georgia General Assembly will need to tackle during the legislative session will be the state budget.

This is a pretty complicated process that takes a lot of time, because we have to make sure all state operations are properly funded without over-

And it's not just one budget to review-there are

get, the state has unexpected expenses from time to time and we will need to review and approve a new budget to keep the numbers balanced. Second, we will need to approve the Fiscal Year 2014 General Budget. Because the FY 2014

budget is based on projections and also how the FY 2013 ends, it will also need to be revised the following year. So where does our state

stand financially? Currently, Georgia is

one of eight states with a Triple AAA bond rating; the highest bond rating available and a symbol of our state's fiscal responsibility. But we are looking at several factors that will require some hard decisions to **Tour Misty Mountain**

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be made in regards to our bud-

Our Revenue Shortfall Reserve—think of it as a "rainy day" fund—is currently sitting at \$328 million.

Our state could operate for a maximum of seven or eight days with this money. However, it's predicted

that we will need to use \$170 million from the "rainy day" fund for K- 12 enrollment growth when we revise the FY 2013 budget. Although the reason for

having the RSR is so that we can dip into it for unexpected expenses, we can't take from it without figuring out how we are going to replenish what was This is going to be a chal-

lenge, because needs in Medicaid, Education, the State Health for at least the next two years. Governor Deal has rec-

ommended some tough spending cuts to state agencies and Medicaid programs to try and 2014 General Budget.

Benefits Plan, Higher Education and Retirement will likely use up any new state revenue

bring in new revenue. If the spending cuts are successful, they will generate \$250 million for the FY 2013 Amended Budget and \$300 million for the FY I wish that was the simple fix to our budget issues, but
