As the festival came to a close on Sunday, all of the volunteers and workers could have been hanging their heads and moping around sad and depressed, but that wasn't the case.

\$17,615.87.

An investigation into the distribution of marijuana resulted in the arrest and prosecution of David James Potter. David James Potter was arrested on April 19, 2015, and subsequently charged and convicted with distribution of a controlled substance, marijuana.

Potter received a sen-

tence of 10 years, five of which are to be served in prison.

As part of this investigation the Sheriff's Office seized a 2006 Chevrolet 1500 that sold for \$10,000, and received \$35,000 in cash from Potter. After the award and disposition of the property, the seizure netted a total of \$45,000.

These two large seizures saved the taxpayers of Union County \$62,615.87 by supplementing the Sheriff's Office operating funds. It will allow the Sheriff's Office to have access to this additional funding, which will be used to acquire much needed law enforcement equipment that was not part of the 2015 operating budget.
