## Union County combined tax rate fifth lowest in the state

Union County Tax Commissioner J.W. Payne was en route to Atlanta on Monday to deliver the county's Tax Digest, five-year tax histories and millage rate resolutions from local governments.

If approved at the state level, tax bills will head to the printer and should begin arriving in the mail in the next

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris. Paris, the five-member Union County School Board, and the five-member Blairsville City Council, all completed the final passage of their millage rates within the last two

weeks. Those resolutions are required before the state grants final approval of the county's Tax Digest.

The county tax rate dropped percentage points, the School Board and City of Blairsville tax rates will remain the same for the new tax "We don't have the ex-

act figures because obviously all 159 counties have not completed their millage rates, but, we expect to be at least the fifth lowest combined millage rate among all 159 counties," Paris said. "We could be lower, it all depends on what the other counties do.

"We're proud to keep our tax rate among the lowest combined rates in the state,' Paris said. "It's going to be

tough on us financially next year, but we made the decision that the public is still hurting. If nothing happens, we'll finish the year with a reserve bal-

Commissioner shaved the county's millage



rate from 5.419 to 5.410 for the upcoming year on Thursday afternoon, Oct. 11; the Union County School Board kept the BOE millage rate at 11.798 Thursday morning, Oct. 11, and the city rate stayed at 2.00 per council vote on Oct. 2.

According to Commissioner Paris, the county based



its new millage rate on what the budget will be for Fiscal "It's a savings of

\$17,000 annually," Paris said, referencing the millage rate decrease. "We won't adopt our budget until the end of taxes and continue to provide the services that we're provid-

Earlier in the day, the Union County Board of Education voted unanimously to keep the current millage rate of 11.798 for the upcoming year. At a 95 percent collection rate, keeping the millage rate at 11.798 results in a \$20,000 shortfall, Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe said.

"Right now there are 14 schools statewide who are running a deficit and that number could go over 80 before the end of this year," Steppe said. "So when you think about it, we're in pretty good shape compared to the
