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
UCHS among top in state graduation rates

Class of 2015 graduation rates are in, and Union County High School has tied for 16th place out of all 624 high schools in Georgia, a total that includes both public and private schools.

The results arrived earlier this month via the Georgia Department of Education's 2015 Four-Year Graduation Rate report, and it showed that UCHS graduated 97.7 percent of its seniors, a rate shared with DeKalb Early College

"I've very, very proud of this for our staff," said UCHS Principal John Hill. "They work very hard to make sure that all our kids that start high school finish high school. If you look at this list, there are only



two schools that ranked above us that would be considered traditional high schools -Lambert High School, that's in Cumming in a very affluent area, and Murray County High School.
"They were ranked a

little bit higher than us, and the other schools that beat us are specialty schools, like Gwinnett School of Mathematics, Science and Technology, which has 100 percent advanced placement This achievement

is especially impressive considering that the national graduation rate average is around 81 percent, according to the latest available data from the National Center for Education Statistics. 'The four-year adjusted

cohort graduation rate defines the cohort based on when a student first becomes a freshman," according to the GaDOE website. "It is calculated using the number of students who graduate within four years and includes adjustments for student transfers. In contrast, Georgia's former graduation rate calculation defined the

cohort upon graduation, which may have included students who took more than four years (to) graduate.'

And according to Hill, no other school in the region is even close to UCHS' graduation rate, and he couldn't be more proud of his faculty and students.

"For us to be ranked among these elite schools with graduation rate – we're doing some things right," said Hill. "Our staff is working really hard to make sure that people are on grade level, that they're doing what they're supposed to. The counseling department is working very diligently with our kids.

"Parents are obviously very supportive to make sure their kids value education, so it's that community/school

The Union County Board of Education has voted to accept a bid for the upcoming Union County Schools Agricultural Science Center, which is expected to begin construction as soon as December and reach completion by May 2016.

The bid for completion of the facility came in at \$2,922,019, which beat pre-bid estimates of between \$3.2 and \$3.3 million, and the bidding process was conducted by Bowen & Watson Construction Managers, the construction management company also responsible for the Union County Schools Fine Arts Center.

"When we started our SPLOST, we did a construction manager at risk, so we sent out bids for somebody to manage all of our construction,' said Union County Schools Associate Superintendent Dr. Jeremy Williams. "That's pretty standard with SPLOST, because what they're then tied to are the projects that we have in our SPLOST, and they guarantee that price and say it won't cost more than that."

According to the adopted budget, which is required by state law to balance, the City of Blairsville's upcoming Operating Revenue Budget for 2016 is \$3,927,900, with a matching Operating Expenditure Budget for

The breakdown for both revenues and expenditures is as follows: \$1,393,700 for the General Fund; \$65,000 for the Hotel/Motel Fund; \$2,148,900 for the Water/ Sewer Fund; and \$320,300 for the Airport Fund.

"Our budget has varied maybe \$400 or \$500 over
