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## Shop With A Cop program needs some cash

Blairsville Police Chief Carroll says the 2014 Shop With A Cop program was \$5,000 in the hole before collections started this year.

That's because a corporate sponsor has pulled out because of conditions beyond their control, Chief Carroll said.

"The community continues to support Shop With A Cop," Chief Carroll said. "And I feel like they will help us make up for the loss of one of our corporate sponsorships."

Shop With A Cop has lit up the faces of almost 700 local youth since the program began in 1999 and Chief Carroll said the need is definitely there to help again in 2014.

The Chief says there are more financially challenged families in Union County than one might think.

"Each year, our list of

names grows. We know who could use some Christmas cheer," Chief Carroll said. "We've had a lot of help over the years, Mom and Pop stores, churches, businesses, individuals and of course the Blairsville Cruisers make a huge difference every year.

"Every year we want to help a few more kids than we did the year before," he

said. "We want to reach 100 or more children this year. We just don't know if we're going to have the funds to do that this year."

Shop With A Cop enters its 15th year with Blairsville Police Department involvement.

"We take the kids shopping, we take them for a meal," said Cindy Neely,

Clerk of Municipal Court and Secretary for Blairsville Police Department. "Each child is allotted a certain amount of money and they shop the way they want to."

Union County Family Connection, teachers and other sources point the department in the direction of prospective shoppers, Neely said.

"These are the kids that fall through the cracks," she said. "It's the kids that are sort of in limbo when it comes to Christmas. Everyone likes to see the eyes of the little ones light up. Well, the tweens (11-17) sort of get left out.

"Yes, they're excited about Shop With A Cop. They've got their made out," she said. "You'd be surprised how many are buying for other family members, not for themselves. It really warms your heart to see

## Paris approves \$14.42 million county budget for Fiscal 2015

The 2015 Union County government budget is set at \$14.42 million.

Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris explained that the \$405,776 increase over the 2014 Fiscal budget included security for the Union County Courthouse.

"The majority of that increase was for courthouse security since we had to cover the six months of 2014 expense that was out of budget and the upcoming year of 2015," Commissioner Paris said. "We were able to pay for the new required equipment out of SPLOST funds, saving on our budget, but negatively impacting our SPLOST funds."

"In addition, other increased expenses were benefit costs at the library, mandated by the state rate," Paris said. "We increased \$20,000 for the Development Authority to be able to spend more on advertising and job creation, we have gone many years without updating our tax and assessor aerial photos, which we are able to join

several other counties and cut the \$50,000 cost basically in half.

"We had a \$35,000 additional cost in our liability and facility insurance, but our largest increase other than security, was more than \$80,000 in Juvenile Court costs," Paris said. "With recent court rulings, the county must pay for those who can not afford to pay themselves in legal and divorce proceedings where children are involved, use to include providing one attorney for

## CVS Pharmacy robbed; suspect sought

Blairsville Police Department and the Georgia Bureau of Investigation were investigating an armed robbery on Monday at CVS Pharmacy off Georgia 515.

The heist happened during the lunch hour. Details are sketchy, but it appears the robber made off with an undisclosed amount of cash. Witnesses say the robber left on foot.

Blairsville Police Chief Johnny Carroll comment about the incident as GBI special agents came to town to assist in the investigation.

Blairsville police, Union County sheriff's deputies and K-9 Deputy Lacey, with handler Jeff McConnell, were at the crime scene, along with GBI special agents.

## Membership group pursues derivative action against EMC

Ten members of Blue Ridge Mountain EMC will move forward with a derivative action seeking the dismissal of BRMEMC General Manager Matthew Akins, General Counsel Lawrence Sorgen, six members of the EMC's Board of Directors, and the EMC's Auditor and Certified Public Accountant Gene Allen.

A derivative action demand letter obtained by the North Georgia News, was sent to BRMEMC on Nov. 6, with specific demands that the EMC Board of Directors assert causes of action against Akins and members of the Board of Directors, Ronnie Burch; William Prather; Bob Enslay; Kenneth Lance; Jerry Nichols; and Greg Owenby. The letter's demand was that the Board of Directors terminate Akins, BRMEMC attorney Sorgen, and BRMEMC's auditor and certified public accountant Allen.



In a letter dated Nov. 17, the membership group learned that the BRMEMC Board voted to reject the demands, according to a correspondence sent by BRMEMC legal counsel Sorgen. "The Board has received and reviewed your letter of November 6, 2014 and has taken action in regard to the matters set forth therein that are relevant to the provisions of O.C.G.A. 46-3-272 and matters concerning derivative actions. Be advised that after due consideration
