The freeze is a direct result of a "\$20,000 budget cut" to the county's funding to operate the Meals on Wheels program.

This is the reason that this Annual Christmas Bazaar is so important because the funds are desperately needed, so that the Senior Center can provide as many seniors as possible with a place where they can enjoy a "hot lunch served daily," seminars on wellness topics, help with gro-

nutritionist who visits the center to provide assistance to those who may be on strict diet regimes, for diabetes, kidneys, or for whatever reason. Besides acting as a place for medical and legal advice, the center also provides a place for Inside
