Commerce. "And in order to do so, we have this year 34 participating businesses who offer 50 percent discounts on either a particular item or grouping of items.

"And of course, once the consumer goes in to purchase that item or just explore the shop, then they also get to learn about other things that these local shops have to offer. That's kind of the point of it, to encourage people to go in, take a look at their store, grab a bite to eat while they're out and about, and do their Christmas shopping locally.'

One thing that makes Jingle Bell Buys different from Buy Local initiatives seen in other communities is the physical coupons shoppers can get their hands on, where the savings from all 34 businesses can be found in one convenient

"What we've done this year is we've grouped the coupons by Eat, Shop and Play, totally to go along with our Buy Local program," said Williams. "Eat, of course, is restaurants, Shop is retailers, and Play would be fun experiences or things to do around the county.'

Some of the savings are for gift certificates that can be purchased for a discount during Jingle Bell Buys and can be used at a later date.

Furthermore, one might be able to get a BOGO (buy one/get one) on a half-pound of Michaelee's fudge, while another location could offer 50 percent off one of its services, such as Sign Makers of FL/ GA, Inc., which will be giving 50 percent off engraving.

"We wanted the items that are featured to be a minimum of half off for the consumer, so we've allowed the participants to do 50 percent off, or buy one/get one free, which equates to the same amount of the discount," said Williams. "So, all 34 businesses and items that are listed are half off.

"It's admirable of the businesses to do that, because they are offering a tremendous discount of their item or product. But that was the point, to make it really worthwhile for the consumer as they get out and about to shop. The key is, you go into the store or you go into the restaurant specifically for the item that's listed, but hopefully you might end up in a place that, first of all, you've never been before, so now you realize, wow, we have this really cool shop in town that I didn't even know existed. Or you've been there before, but you end up buying a couple of extra things because you thought, oh, wow, that would make a good Christmas gift for mom.'

Following each Buy Local program, the chamber surveys its participating chamber members to gauge the success of these ventures.

"The best weekend that we've ever had, we estimated based on the responses of the survey, and of course not everybody always fills out the survey - but we estimated an additional \$10,000 into the community from that one weekend," said Williams.

"That was the best weekend that we know that we've had, but generally you're going to have multiple thousand dollars that are coming in, that people go in and they specifically say, I'm here for Jingle Bell Buys, I want to use my coupons, and again, they may purchase additional items while they're

So some of the participating businesses have them, and as people are out and about, they may see that sign that says Coupons Available Here, and they can just ask the business owner for a copy.
