"It's beautiful music," said Alice Harmon. "I love music and I couldn't resist being here this evening. It's like sitting at the feet of God and listening to the angels have a jam session. It's music to soothe the soul."

The orchestra began in 2002 as a community and school orchestra at North Georgia College and State University.

In the summer of 2006, the community portion of the orchestra, along with a few college students, formed an ensemble known as North Georgia Sweet Strings and played for assisted living/ nursing home facilities in the North Georgia area and for events in Dahlonega.

In spring 2007, the group decided to separate from the school and become a private organization with the goal of growing into an organization with community support, community players, professional players and local college students to add orchestral music to an area where bluegrass, old-time and other musical traditions already had a firm foothold.

The group also wanted to provide an orchestra and ensemble for local students interested in classical music.

Playing as The Appalachian Chamber Orchestra from The North Georgia Chamber Symphony, Inc., the reconstituted organization holds concerts in Blairsville and Dahlonega, and Windstream Communications films the Blairsville event, broadcasting it on the cable network

and creating a DVD for sale.

Smith, who started the orchestra and has been its director and conductor ever since, studied extensively in the New York area with Masao Kawasaki and Itzhak Perlman

Since returning to his native Georgia, he has shared that knowledge with the members of the group and his students.

An accomplished violinist, Smith performs regularly with symphony orchestras and chamber music ensembles in the area.

Current members performing regularly with the group include Bob Christmas (concertmaster), Barbara Spruell, first violin; Betty Florence, Laura Chambless and Jason Belcher, second violin; Paula Jean Redditt, third violin; Rebecca Gerstenlauer, viola; Nancy Mack and Jan Hill, cello.

The orchestra also is comprised of professional musicians.
