The City of Blairsville is investing in one of its biggest economic development tools, Blairsville Municipal Airport.

The city is in the midst of a \$689,000-plus upgrade project that includes paving for a new North Terminal parking area, the taxi-way area paved, in yet another step in making a North Terminal come to fruition, Mayor Jim Conley said.

"All of this has to be done before we can move forward with building a new terminal building," Mayor Conley said. "Of course we've got a new road leading into that area already. Many thanks to Commissioner Lamar Paris and a grant that came from the Georgia Department of Trans-

Former UCHS parapro charged with child porn, sexual assault at school

A 28-year-old former paraprofessional at Union County High School faces charges of sexual assault and two counts of sexual exploitation of children, or child pornography, related to an alleged physical relationship with a Union County High School female student, Union County Sheriff's reports show.

William Christopher Courson, of Blairsville, is free on bail, and is represented by a local attorney, Union County Superior Court records show.

During an interview with sheriff's investigators, Courson accused the victim of trying to set him up by us-

ing his classroom computer to make it look like he was sending her personal messages, sheriff's reports show.

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City eyes \$1.69 million water project

The city of Blairsville is on the verge of a \$1.69 million water system improvement project from Pat Haralson Drive to Deep South Farm Road.

The project involves replacement of aging 2-inch PVC water lines with modern 6-inch lines that withstand the need for water pressure.

It also entails upgrading water meters with uber modern Automated Meter Reading technology, said Blairsville Mayor Jim Conley.

Chip McGaughey, an engineer for EMI, presented two projects to the City Council.

The first is the Water System Improvement Project for Pat Haralson Drive to Deep South Farm Road, which entails larger water lines going under Pat Haralson Drive and to the end of Deep South Farm Road.

"The truth is, we don't know exactly how old those water lines really are out Haralson Drive and Deep South Farm Road," the mayor said. "We've got the hospital out there and if there's a break on Haralson or Deep South roads, we're in a bind and their lacking water pressure. It's a must do project.

The second project is a Meter Replacement Project which would upgrade meters for City customers to AMR meters, Automated Meter Reading, Mayor Conley said.

would be more cost effective, save on human error and be more efficient than the outdated meters resulting in a possible gain in revenue, he said.

McGaughey told the council that if these projects could be done in unison, the City would save on support costs.

The deadline to apply for the funding is Dec. 31. The current interest rate is 1.82 percent but the City could get

a 1 percent reduction if it combines the Meter Change Out program with the water improvement project.

"It's also possible we could have principle forgiveness up to 20 percent through federal funding," Mayor Conley said.

The cost estimate for the combined projects amount to \$1.69 million and some change, McGaughey told the council.
