Gas prices dropping outside of Blairsville

have prices dropped significantly in recent weeks. Thanks to the bottom

dropping out of the cost of crude oil, many locations are seeing prices at or below \$2 a gallon.

In Blue Ridge, gas prices are \$1.93 a gallon. Prices throughout Fannin County are at or below \$2 a "Gasoline prices are

plunging with little sign of slowing down," said Mark Jenkins, spokesman for AAA - The Auto Club Group. "Oil prices dropped for the fourth consecutive week because of increased oil production and low demand, and that's keeping downward pressure on the price of gasoline. It is unclear exactly how low prices will go, but gasoline will keep getting cheaper as long as oil does.

In Blairsville and Union County, that's not entirely the case.

Prices have dropped and range from \$2.19 a gallon to \$2.43 per gallon.

While gas prices fell below \$2 a gallon at various filling stations in Northeast Georgia and Tennessee over the weekend, prices in Florida are not far behind. The lowest prices in Florida are in the Jacksonville area at about \$2.10 a gallon. If prices keep falling at a rate of 2 cents a day, Florida motorists could begin finding gasoline below \$2 by the end of the week.

Though gas prices are as cheap as they have been in Blairsville and Union County since 2009, many question why they aren't similar in nature to neighboring Blue
